The rise of the tide along our coast is an follows: Boston, 3 to 11 feet; Newport, R. I., 3½ to 4½ feet; Sandy Hook, 3½ to 5½ feet. Delaware Breakwater, 3 2-5 to 5 1-8 feet. and Old Point Comfort, Va., 1½ to 3 feet.

The ebb and flow of tidal waves depend upon the moon to a great extent. Twice avery day we have the tides, twolve hours apart, and the flow and ebb are merely examples of the attraction of gravitation, which is exercised on all bodies, whether liquid or solid. The sun also aids in the effect, but as the moon is so much nearer the earth her influence is considered to be greater. The tides are hishest at the equator and lowest at the poles.
