U. S. LOSS IS \$1,500,000

Contract Provided Both Nations Must Stand Damage by Accident New York, Aug. 26 .- Three-fourths of the sum agreed upon for the building of the ZR-2 has already been paid. The total cost of the ship was to have been \$2,000,000, but the contract provided that in the event of a total or partial loss of the airship before her delivery to the United States the financial damage would be borne equally between the builders and the United States Government. 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
