## **GIANTS SLIP SKIDS UNDER PIRATES AND** SHORTEN THEIR LEAD

Four Games in a Row Take Wind Out of Sails of Pennant-Chasing Buccaneers-Gibson's Men Helpless Against First-Division Teams

IN BASEBALL, the same as in other sports, there's many a slip 'twixt the hip and the lip. One never can tell what will happen, and the best example of this is the present series between the league-leading Pirates and the ambitious, hard-working, second-place Giants. In three days the men of John McGraw have silved a perfectly good lead of seven and one-half games to three and one-half, with a chance to make it worse than that today. In other words, Pittsburgh strolled nonchalantly into New York on Tuesday and now is staggering around waiting for samebody to count up to ten.

The flop of the Pirates and the spurt of the Glauts are the two sensa-

tions in baseball this week. Nobody ever expected it. The Giants had a tough time with St. Looie and Cincinnati also took a fall out of them. While this was going on Gibson's athletes smeated our Phils for four out of five and copped two out of three from Boston. They had lost but two games on the trip, bad a big lead and confidently expected to increase it in New York.

Then came the startling upset in the well-known and often-mentioned dope. Instead of taking it on the hip or doing a nose dive, the Glants suddenly realized they were pennant contenders and stepped right out and socked the gents who were bunded the gonfalon a mouth ago. They took both ends of a double-header and two single contests, making the total four up and one to go. They took a lot of eterm out of the Corsairs and injected some confidence into themselves. That cocksure, peppery feeling has oozed out of the league leaders and no one can predict when the slump will end. They certainly are on the shids, but, with a three and one-buff game lead, have a chance to recover. If they win today they will be four and one-half in front, and all they have to do then is play Brooklyn. Today Pittsburgh has a total of 76 victories and 45 defeats, but most

of the victories were secred over the mound division clubs. The Pirates can't do much with the leaders. To date some 51 games have been played with the Boston, Brooklyn and New York clubs, and the percentage is 471. This means they wen 24 and lost 27 games. The grand percentage of the club is 628, which shows how kind the second division unfortunites treated them.
