 Wilmington, Del., Sept. 6.—This is the children's day at the Delaware State Fair. Thousands of youngsters came here prepared for a long day of fun. Family dinner parties were the order of the day, with hundreds of well-filled picnic baskets being carried by visitors from all parts of the State. A special feature this afternoon was the fair-milk play by children from all parts of this city.

During the morning there was a tractor demonstration, showing the varied kinds of farm machines and improved methods of planting, cultivation and harvesting of crops.

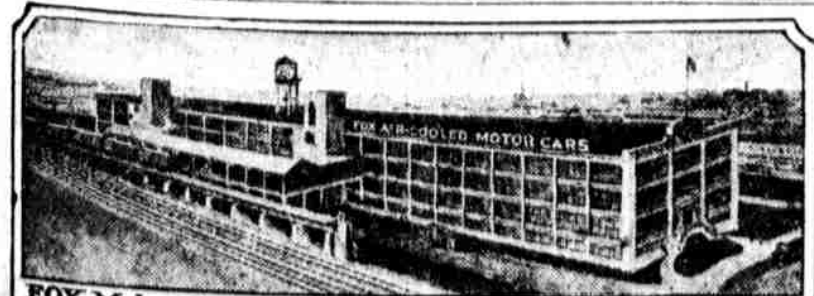
