

TWINING SAYS CITY MAY RUN NEW "L"

Transit Director Tells Frankford Agreement With P. R. T. Is Not Essential

CARS READY ON JANUARY 1

The city will maintain and operate the Frankford elevated system, if necessary, until such time as the P. R. T. Company is ready to take it over on what the city considers an equitable arrangement. Director Twining wrote today to the Frankford Board of Trade.

The cars that will be used on the elevated will be ready by January 1, the Director said, and it is hoped to get the elevated running as soon thereafter as possible.

Recently C. P. Zeak, executive secretary of the Frankford Board of Trade, wrote to the Mayor, asking when the Frankford line would be ready for operation. The Mayor referred the letter to Director Twining for an answer, and the reply, which was sent today and made public by the Mayor.

On the question whether the city or the P. R. T. would operate the line, the Director said:

"It is the Mayor's intention that the Frankford elevated line shall be completed and put into operation as quickly as possible. It is preferred that the operation shall be by the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company, but in case an equitable agreement cannot be secured promptly the city will undertake the operation of the line until such time as the company is willing to enter into an equitable agreement."

Other questions asked concerned sites for sub-stations and power houses. Director Twining said the Mayor had signed an ordinance permitting the city to condemn land on September 1. Bids will be advertised for buildings, Director Twining said, September 15, and for machinery and equipment, with underground conduits, cables and distribution system, on September 15.

The Director also informed the Frankford business men the city did not contemplate erection of any shops in addition to the inspection shop at Bridge street at this time. This shop, the Director said, would be abundantly able to take care of any repairs involved in the maintenance of the fifty cars the city is providing.

WILL BENEFITS BROTHER

Mrs. J. V. Shoemaker's Estate Goes Eventually to Church and Education
Mrs. Jenny M. Shoemaker, widow of Dr. John V. Shoemaker, of 1805 Walnut street, who died September 3, left an estate valued at \$136,000, according to her will, admitted to probate here today.

After making a number of private bequests, Mrs. Shoemaker directed that the residue of her estate be held in trust for her brother, Archibald V. Logan.

At the brother's death one-fourth of the principal of the residue will go to the Sixth United Presbyterian Church of Pittsburgh, for home missions; one-

fourth to the Calvary Presbyterian Church, Fifteenth and Locust streets, for foreign missions, and one-half to the trustees of Jefferson Medical College for the establishment of a memorial fund to her husband. This fund, she directed, shall be used to aid poor students in defraying their expenses at college. Not more than \$300 a year shall be given a student. Preference is to be shown Pennsylvanians.

Other wills admitted to probate include those of Mary Diemilt, 1812 North Seventh street, \$126,500, and William W. Ingham, 4515 Spruce street, \$40,000.

Letters of administration were granted in the estate of George H. Bueh, 3307 North Broad street, who left \$4700.

Inventories were filed in the estates of Alfred Parrish, \$76,194.23; Paul H. Carter, \$182,706.02, and Katherine Batzle, \$5800.14.
