

BERRY DENOUNCES GAILOR ON LIQUOR

Methodist Bishop Declares Episcopal Prelate Encourages Prohibition Violators

CALLS IT INEFFECTIVE

Bishop Gailor has given more encouragement to open violation of the Eighteenth Amendment by characterizing it as hysteria than have a thousand other men not supposed to be above reproach in matters of morality and religion.

In that statement, Bishop Joseph F. Berry, of the Methodist Church, summed up his opinion of Bishop Thomas Gailor's criticism of the prohibition amendment. Bishop Gailor is a leader of the Episcopal Church.

Speaking in Salt Lake City, Bishop Gailor asserted that "the writing into our Constitution of the Eighteenth Amendment was unpardonable." He said the Church was making headway against the evils of the liquor traffic when the war began, and it "was nothing short of hysteria that put over a restriction which could not hope to suppress the evil."

Replying to the Episcopal Bishop, Bishop Berry said his "sensational statement" would give comfort to the "vicious" but that nothing would come of it, because the liquor traffic is deeper than a doornail.

Bishop Berry frowned as he read Bishop Gailor's statement yesterday at his office in the Wesley Building.

"I deeply sympathize with the clergymen and members of the Protestant Episcopal Church if the extraordinary statement which is credited by the press to Bishop Thomas F. Gailor, a very representative prelate of that Church, is true," Bishop Berry said.

"The statement of Bishop Gailor will be repudiated by multitudes of Episcopalians, but it will bring cheer and gladness to multitudes of representatives of the rum constituency.

"Just at this time, when bootlegging is rampant in so many communities and there seems to be concerted action to break down the Federal prohibitory law, it seems a pity that a representative of any Christian church should speak words giving encouragement to those defiant violators of the law.

"I have no doubt that Bishop Gailor has given more encouragement to open violation of the law than have a thousand other men, who are not supposed to be above reproach in matters of morality and religion, by characterizing the Federal law as 'hysteria.' I think it should be understood that the good Bishop is speaking for himself, and in no sense is he voicing the conviction of the great mass of people in that exceptionally fine communion known as the Protestant Episcopal Church.

"Of course, no friend of prohibition will be discouraged by such an utterance as this. Prohibition of the rum traffic is here to stay. No power on earth or in hell can lead the American people to reverse their decision. When the lawless element discover that they cannot trifle with the expressed will of the American people they will subside."

The Rev. Dr. W. Edward Rafferty, editor-in-chief of the Department of Sunday School Publications of the American Baptist Publication Society, characterized Bishop Gailor's statement as "nonsense."

\$51,000,000 COMPENSATION

Workmen's Bureau at Harrisburg Gives Figures for Six Years

The recent tabulation of records of the Workmen's Compensation Bureau at Harrisburg shows that a total of 1,080,353 accidents had been reported from the time the Workmen's Compensation Law became effective, January 1, 1916, to September 1, 1921. Of that number 15,517 were fatal cases. The total compensation awarded in the fatal cases was \$30,712,244. Of that amount \$8,827,229 had been paid to September 1, 1921. In addition \$21,108,980 had been paid in temporary disability cases. In August, 146 fatal accidents were reported to the bureau at Harrisburg. Of that number fifty-three were industrial accidents, thirty-one public service and sixty-two mine accidents. Philadelphia and Allegheny Counties led in the number of fatal accidents, each having seventeen.

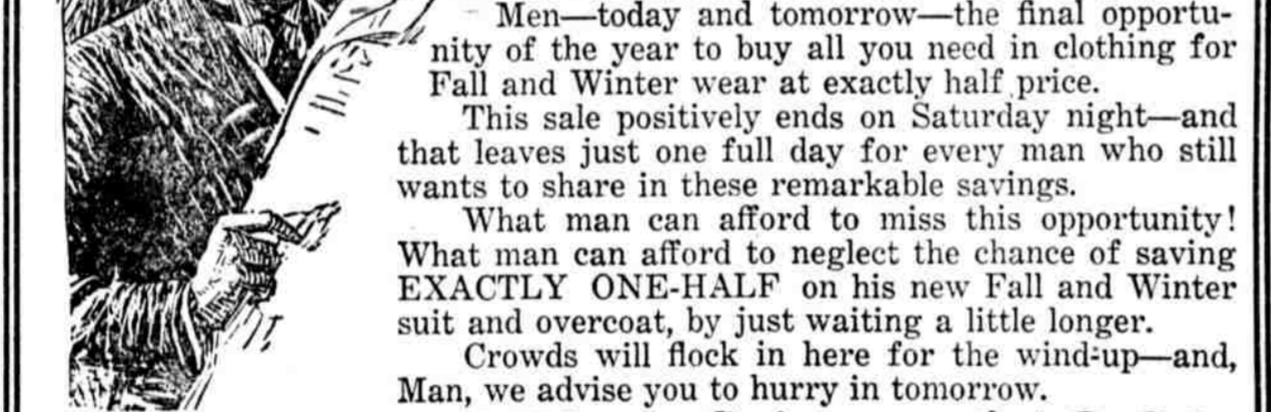

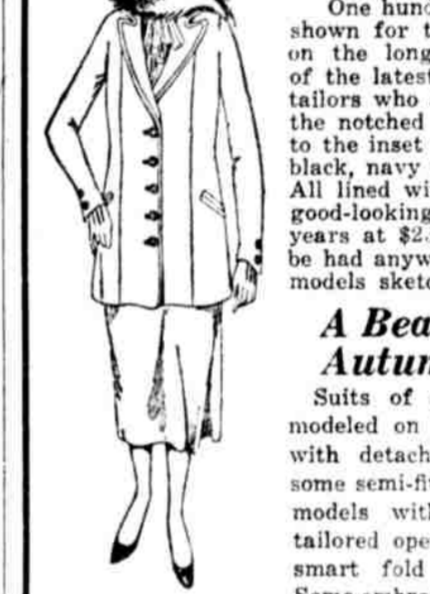
