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HOME FOR INCURABLES IS HAPPINESS FACTORY

Patients, Though Bedridden or Otherwise Afflicted, Maintain Zest for Life Amid Cheerful Surroundings

"Dis is the place where they manufacture pleasure and happiness," was written under the picture of a jolly-looking little Dutch boy. The entire thing was made by a one-time school teacher, now a patient in the Philadelphia Home for Incurables, Forty-eighth street and Woodland avenue. And those few words express the state of mind of the man. Crippled most fearfully with rheumatism, his most constant pain is his face and his face can just manage to make his way about his room, and yet each new day, which means one day less for him, finds him with a smile on his face and a cheerful word for every one.

There are about 150 patients in the home, some crippled with rheumatism, others suffering from heart disease, aplexy and locomotor ataxia. All know they are beyond cure. One girl has rheumatism so badly that she cannot lift her hand above her waistline. At meals she uses a fork with a very long handle. As visitors pass her door she looks up and smiles, cheerfully nodding her head and always ready with a bright answer.

Cheerful Patients. One man was brought in the home not so long ago, who lay flat on his back and had lain so for four years. "The day he came here," said the nurse superintendent, "I had the nurse and orderly move him on his side and he was perfectly delighted. And now he is able to be moved quite frequently, and his face is wreathed with smiles."

The superintendent pointed out a cheerful little woman. "This patient," she explained, "has never in her life walked. Always she has wheeled her chair about in a chair, and yet for years she did what I call raised a family. She was the aunt, and it was a case of 'Oh, Auntie will do it.' She sewed for the children, mended and did what chores she could in a limited way. About here she mended the day long and is always glad to have company."

A lad sixteen years old with a broken back was sent to the home for care. He had never been able to stand, and a day long he could do nothing but gaze out of the window. A colored man patient took pity upon him and taught him to read and write. And now the young fellow smiles as he reads the jokes in magazines and diverts his mind.

It is no uncommon thing to see two or three old ladies with their heads close together, and bobbing in time to the wagging of their tongues. There is so much to be discussed!
