

LOSES HER POSITION THEN DISAPPEARS

Eighteen-Year-Old Eighth Street Girl Missing From Home Since Saturday

POLICE ARE SEARCHING

Horror of war and the cold efficiency of a strange land have combined to drive an eighteen-year-old Polish girl to some desperate act, her parents believe.

She disappeared from her home at 1910 North Eighth street Saturday, after her discharge from a store for inebriety.

Jennie Scharchar has been in this country only six months and has been earnestly striving to learn English despite the fact she was speechless for two months after her arrival here, due to the unspeakable horrors attendant on being a helpless woman in a town occupied by a German invading army.

Although her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Scharchar, were in this country when she was living in Chekanoff, Poland, near Warsaw, when that town was overrun by the Germans in 1917. Following this experience she suffered a nervous breakdown and her parents managed to get her back to this country.

On the boat coming over Jennie's nervous affliction resulted in the loss of her voice and she could not speak a word from March to May 27.

There is fear that the loss of her position brought about a relapse of the shell shock that caused her to lose her speech earlier in the year, and that she may be wandering speechless in this or some other big city.

Jennie's mother said this morning that the girl had received a wound on the arm from a bomb dropped on the

The boys are Joseph Marchetti, twenty-one years old; Thomas Stewart, twenty-one, and Angelo Peluso, nineteen. Peluso comes from Cortland, N. Y., the others from Rome.

Peluso owns a small sedan and the youngsters were out on a party in Rome, Wednesday night, when the idea occurred to them to come to Philadelphia and visit an aunt of one of the girls. When they were about thirty miles outside of Philadelphia the gas gave out. They tried to get some money from a farmer, but the only way they could get it was in the good old-fashioned way, so the boys got rakes and went out into the hay field and the girls worked around the house. They filled the tank and came here.
