LABOR LEADERS WARS UNIONS AGAINST KU KLUX KLAN

Matthew Woll, A. F. L. Official, Demands Federal Probe of Klan's "Invisible Empire"

"WHISPERED LIES" SPREAD BY KLAN TO FAN HATRED AGAINST JEWS IN AMERICA

Menace of World-Wide Revolt Engineered From Moscow and Uprising of Blacks in U. S. Broached in Anonymous Attacks WORKERS MUST HELP STAMP OUT SECRET ORGANIZATION, WOLL SAYS

Lieutenant of Gompers Denounces Followers of "Fiery Cross" as Enemies of American Ideals and Fomenters of Class Feeling and Discord

The Ku Klux Klan, Inc., while pumping the virus of racial and religious prejudice throughout the Nation, makes use of poisonous propaganda against the Jews.

Evidence of these whispered or outspoken maledictions can be found in the Searchlight, the Atlanta publication which has on its mailing lists a multitude of Grand Gobblins, King Kleagles and other functionaries of the order.

Just as the Klansmen mask their identities behind hoods and gowns does the order shroud its anti-Semitic attitude behind anonymous signatures in "contributions" to the Searchlight, which is mailed to all the States in which the "Invisible Empire" has gained a foothold.

One of the vicious attacks made on the Jewish people is that agitators of that race are plotting to create a war between the whites and the Negroes, to destroy the American Government.

The Jews now, the allegations go on, are interested in overthrowing Christian Russia and, through the Third Internationale at Moscow, are working to destroy all the Gentile Governments of the world.

WOLL'S WARNING TO LABOR

Washington, Sept. 16.—Warning to organized labor against the conduct of the Ku Klux Klan and its antagonism to trade unionism was issued today by Matthew Woll, vice president of the American Federation of Labor and close associate of Samuel Gompers in determining labor policies. Mr. Woll called upon the Federal Government to make a thorough investigation of Ku Kluxism and its operations.

"Ku Kluxism as preached by its self-styled Emperor and as practiced by his followers is a menace to American freedom. The very title of the principal official shows its un-Americanism. There is no room for any Emperor in America."

"I am satisfied that it would be impossible to find a trade unionist who belongs to the Ku Klux Klan. Trade unions stand for democracy; the Ku Klux Klan stands for a sneaking, cowardly autocracy, working in the dark, striking under cover, making one pretense here and another somewhere else."

"The conduct of the Ku Klux Klan in the Northwest should be sufficient to warn every labor man of what the spread of this Klanishness may mean. In that great section the Klan has been bitterly hostile to trade unionism, and I have no doubt will be, when opportunity offers, just as bitterly hostile elsewhere."

"In portions of the South the Klan has been driving Negroes to work, regardless of wages and conditions. It is an outrageous institution, abhorrent to every American principle. In the Klan there is a vicious principle swathed in a mass of ritualistic buncombe. Its greatest attraction is for the credulous, the superstitious, the vain and the foolish."

"The United States Government, through proper agencies, should investigate thoroughly the whole range of Ku Klux operations. There is no room for an Invisible Empire in a democracy, and I am satisfied that the whole voice of trade unionism demands its eradication."

Other labor leaders endorse the statement of Mr. Woll, among them Thomas Flaherty, of the National Federation of Postoffice Clerks.

ARBUCKLE 'DEATH PARTY' DRANK 40 QUARTS OF LIQUOR

Prosecutor to Decide Today if Murder Charge Will Be Pressed

WITNESSES ARE GUARDED TO PREVENT TAMPERING

San Francisco, Sept. 16.—District Attorney Matthew Brady has announced that he will make public today his decision whether to try Roscoe ("Tatty") Arbuckle for murder in connection with the death of Miss Virginia Rappe, or whether he will prosecute solely upon the manslaughter indictment returned by the Grand Jury.

Arbuckle was to be arraigned before Police Judge Sylvian Lazarus today for preliminary examination on a charge of murder preferred by Mrs. B. M. Delmonico.

Attorneys for the film star yesterday deposited \$50,000 cash bail to cover the manslaughter charge, and should District Attorney Brady announce his decision to prosecute, he will be allowed to stand on his own feet.

Should decision be made to prosecute for murder, however, Arbuckle would be forced to remain in jail under California law first-degree murder is not a bailable offense.

BEAUTY-SHOP MAN HELD IN RUM PLOT

C. W. Holden Charged With Being Leader in Smuggling Conspiracy

TO NAB 6 OTHERS AT SHORE

Atlantic City, Sept. 16.—Charles W. Holden, who conducts a beauty shop at 1000 Pacific avenue, was arrested by United States Deputy Marshals Moseley and Ossowitz today, charged with being one of the ringleaders in the gigantic smuggling conspiracy which has been flooding New Jersey and Pennsylvania with contraband liquor brought from West Indian ports by speedy schooners.

Arraigned before United States Commissioner Steinhilber, "Dr." Holden, on the request of Assistant United States District Attorney Pearce, was held under \$10,000 bail for a further hearing.

Mr. Pearce declared the arrest was the most important capture in the Government's campaign against rum-runners so far made, with the exception of Crossland, the Florida millionaire.

From information and evidence in his possession, he said, "Holden has been the financial agent of the conspirators and has been acting as 'go-between' for the North and South. Further than this I cannot announce at the present time."

Holden, dressed in the height of fashion, was ill at ease when he faced the Government officers. Asked whether he could procure bail, he said that he had been trying to locate a friend in Philadelphia who would get some one to go to his bond. In the absence of any bondsmen he was lodged in the City Jail and will be transferred to either Trenton or Camden this afternoon in the event a bondsmen fails to appear by then.

Warrants for six or eight other men, most of them residents of the county, have been issued and will be served by a force of deputy marshals under the command of Chief Deputy Marshal Snowden as speedily as the men can be located.

Customs Inspectors M. Dermott and Reynolds, who have been assisting Mr. Pearce in securing evidence against the smugglers, are still in the city. It was on their information that the warrants were issued.

"We have learned that the cargo of the schooner Henry L. Marshall, seized in New York, was unloaded off the coast by the aid of the liquor was sent to Philadelphia by truck to the home of Pearce. "We know who helped to load the trucks and some of them will be arrested today. The booze, of course, has been distributed by this time and we have no hopes of locating it."
