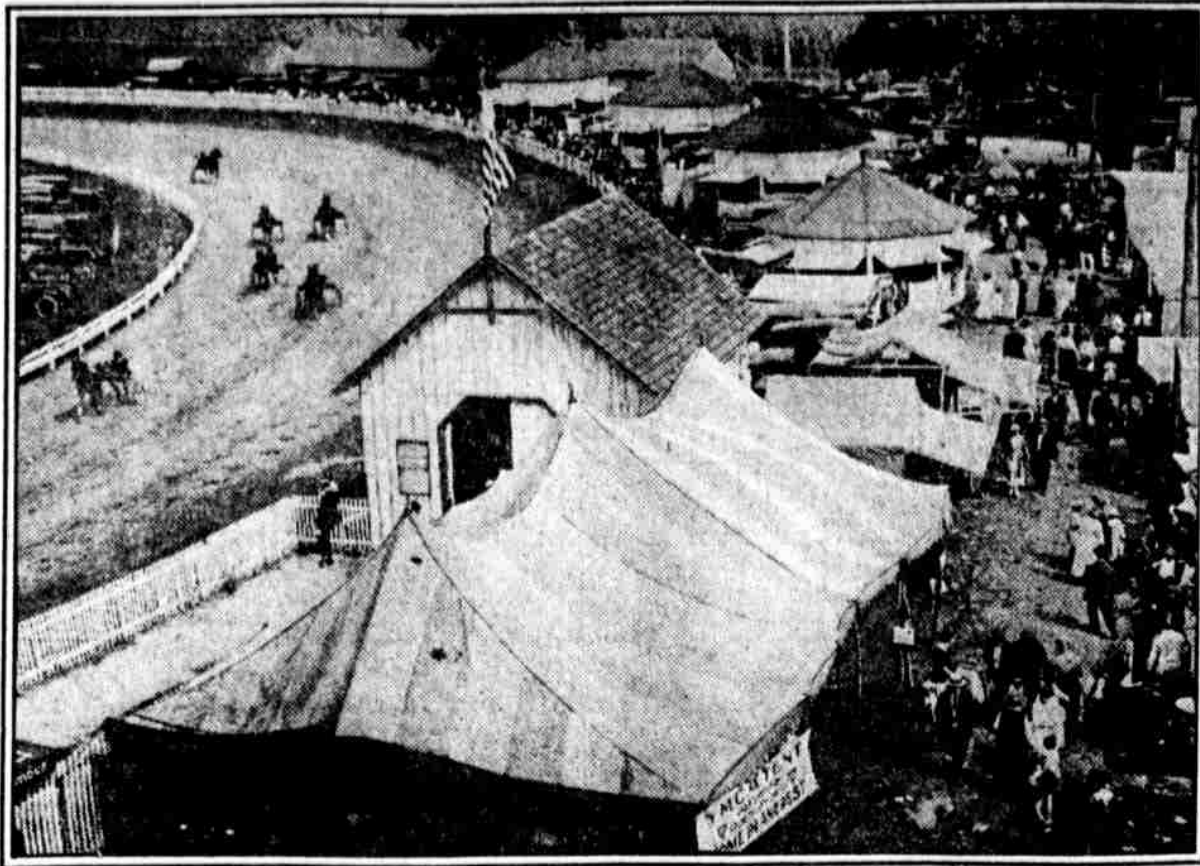

THE POLO MATCHES draw society folk from near and far. Here is Mrs. William Adamson, of Philadelphia and New York, at a crisis in the game.



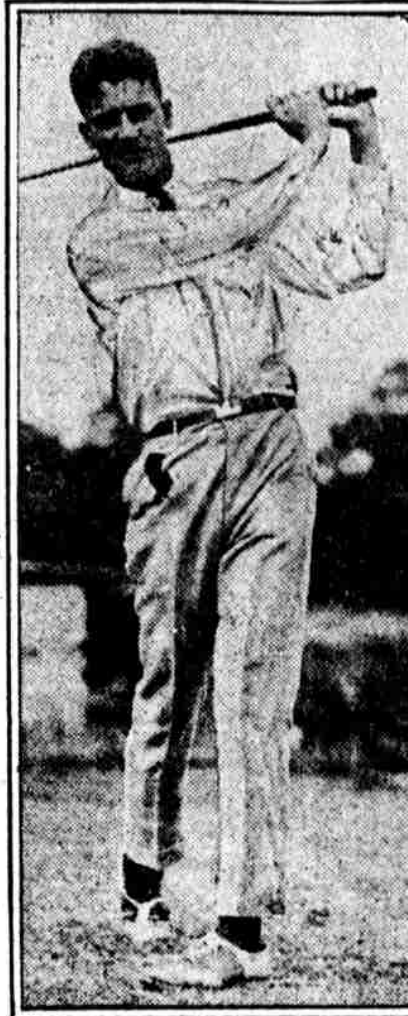
IF BIG TIRES make for easy riding, the man on the right need not worry over the condition of the roads. The London people were so interested he had trouble making way through crowd.

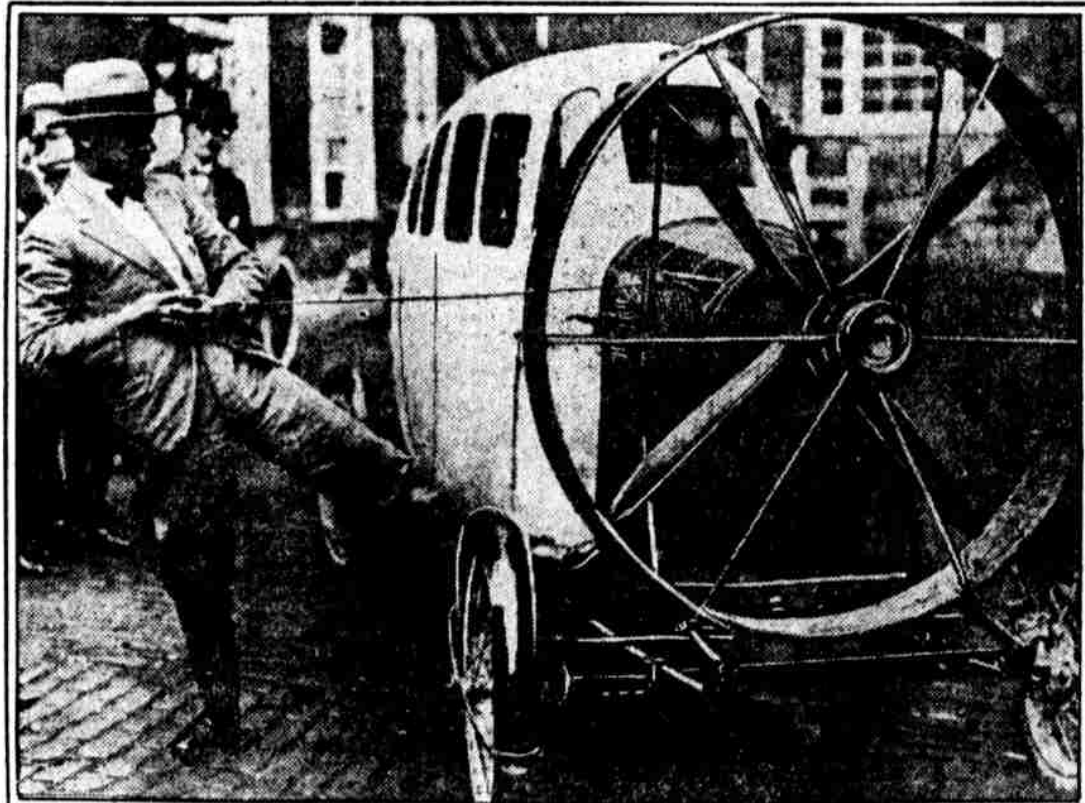
