Dyer Will Leave No Stone Unturned to Get Sweeping Investigation

PROSECUTION LOOMING UP

Washington, Sept. 19.—Steps have been taken to demand an investigation by Congress of the Ku Klux Klan. Several members are understood to be preparing resolutions of inquiry about which they will not make announcement until ready to act formally.

Many Demands for Probe Meanwhile from all sections are coming demands for an investigation. Mr. Dyer, in explaining his plan, said: "I am at work gathering together authorities and looking up statistics to see if Congress has authority to make such an inquiry."

The first step after introducing it would be to ask the Rules Committee to make the resolution immediately in order. As soon as it is passed by the House I shall ask the chairman of the Judiciary Committee to appoint a sub-committee to conduct the inquiry.

Negro Leaders Wrought Up Letters of protest against the organization from Catholic, Jewish and Negro organizations are pouring in on members of the House.

Klan Makes Own Law The law of the Klan is justice. Dr. Paul was approached and arrested by three (masked) men and instructed to go with them.

Beaumont, Tex., July 21, 1921.

Mr. Alfred Jones, Editor of the Beaumont Enterprise, Beaumont, Texas.

Dear Sir: Your publication, since the organization of the Ku Klux Klan in the city of Beaumont, has on various occasions published information concerning and pertaining to the affairs of this organization.

As follows: We believe, as you do, that a newspaper should serve the best interests of its constituency and that all legitimate news should be given the public through its columns.

"The Eye of the Unknown" "That this organization does not countenance and will not stand for social parasites remaining in this city. It is equally opposed to the gambler, the trickster, the moral degenerate and the man who lives by his wits and is without noble means of support."

Many Outrages Reported With the showing of this indecent and unwelcome, the Evening Public Ledger reports a large number of lawless acts reported in the newspapers as having been committed in various parts of the United States this year.

Texas Is Klan Hotbed In the State of Texas alone in the last six months, nearly fifty cases have been reported involving either violent lawless acts or threats of such action, and involving also either the Ku Klux Klan or masked individuals or mobs, as follows:

March 17, Houston—A. V. Hopkins, prominent business man, kidnapped and taken to point outside city whipped and tarr'd. He was taken to town next day. Hopkins was called from a business meeting by his assailants.

Women Stripped, by "Chivalrous Klansmen,"

Chivalry and the protection of womanhood among the principles and aims of the Ku Klux Klan, Inc., according to the printed "literature" of its propaganda department.

Yet white women have been stripped of their clothing, fogged and covered with sticky mess of tar and feathers by hooded and gowned "regulators."

Lynching Plot Foiled July 14, Greenville—Matt Glisen, Negro, removed from jail just before crowd of 100 masked men gathered and demanded the release of a white farmer.

July 16, Beaumont—R. F. Scott, of Deweyville, who was a marine during the war, was arrested by Klansmen and dumped into the business street at 10 o'clock at night.

July 17, Nacogdoches—J. W. McKnight, former deputy sheriff, was arrested by Klansmen and dumped into the business street at 10 o'clock at night.

July 20, Lufkin—Sherwood Vinson seized at railroad station by masked party, taken from city, tarred, feathered and dumped out in business section.

July 21, Lufkin—George Lee, chauffeur, was arrested by Klansmen and dumped out in the heart of business section.

July 22, Dallas—Edward Engers, filling-station proprietor, fogged by Klansmen and dumped out in business section.

July 25, Austin—Judge J. R. Hamilton, of Criminal District Court, arrested by Grand Jury into Ku Klux Klan robes.

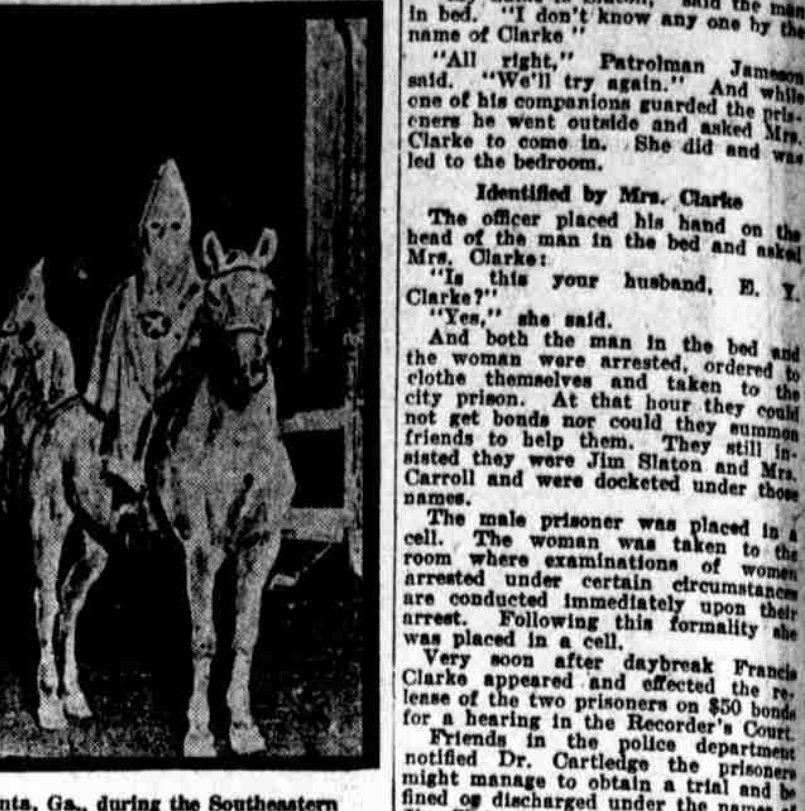
