Six minority party magistrates are to be elected in November. The Democrats nominated eleven candidates Tuesday and in the ordinary course of events would seat six of the eleven on the minor bench.

But the Combine, it is reported, does not intend to let events develop along ordinary lines. Plans are under consideration for the pre-emption of a new party title, which must be done twenty-eight days before the November election.

By running candidates for magistrate under the new party title the election then will develop into a grand scramble as far as the minor representation is concerned. By similar factics two rears ago the Vare organization elected Magistrate Carney.
Under the law the seventeen candi-


