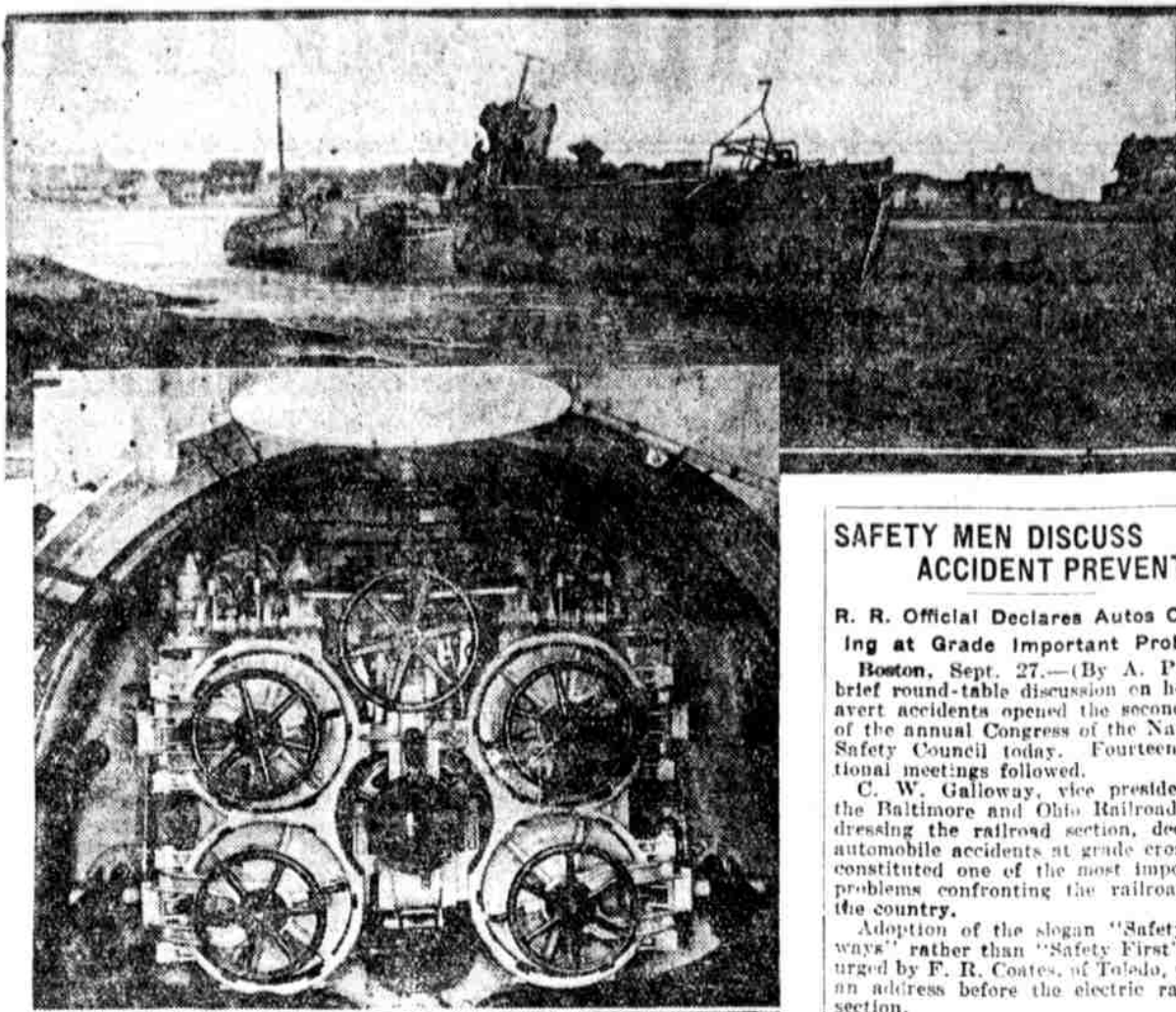
GOLDEN WEDDING AT SHORE Philadelphia Couple Will Entertain Fifty Guests Tonight

THIRD BAIL EFFORT FREED POLICEMAN

Judge Stern Says Lawyer Did Not Tell Him Other Courts Had Refused to Act

BOND O. K'D BY ROTAN AIDE

Judge Horace Stern, who released Patrolman Philip Pourron, under arrest as the slayer of seventeen-year-old Francis McCabe, 2026 Winter street, did so not knowing that Judges Audenried and Davis had refused to set bail for the defendant.

The Judge not only made this assertion today when asked about the circumstances which led up to the freeing of the patrolman on bail last night, but declared that if he had known of these previous refusals he would not have touched the case.

Judge Stern declared further that he had called up Assistant District Attorney Spelzer before granting Pourron his liberty, and the District Attorney's representative had said he thought it would be proper to set the patrolman free.

Judge Stern said Mr. Spelzer told him he thought that \$2500 bail would be sufficient, but that the Judge, doubting it and making it \$3000.

Coroner Knight Surprised Coroner Knight, who yesterday condemned the action of the patrolman in firing his revolver, professed surprise when he learned that Pourron had been freed.
