

## 2 KILLED, 8 HURT IN STREET MISHAPS

Boy and Girl Lose Lives—One Hit by Auto, Other by Trolley Car

### THREE ARE ARRESTED

A boy and a girl were killed and four boys, two girls and two men were injured within the last twenty-four hours in accidents on the city streets.

The boy killed was Edward Lannahan, eight years old, 275 West Fishers lane. He was riding in a small express wagon in Fishers lane, with Woolrow Ward, nine years old, 8221 North Second street, and Joseph Hunter, ten, 224 West Fisher's lane. As they coasted down the lane toward Third street, they were struck by an automobile.

The Lannahan boy was steering. The other boys were injured about the head and body. Herbert J. Weber, 5012 North Fifth street, driver of the automobile, was arrested and held without bail by Magistrate Price, to await the action of the coroner. The boys were taken to the Jewish Hospital.

The little girl killed was Margaret Cony, six years old, 218 Sigel street. She was run down by a trolley car at Second and Sigel streets, just after she had left a candy store, where she had spent a cent given her by her mother.

John Aih, Torredale avenue, motorman of the car, was held by police of the Third and Dickinson streets station, to await the action of the coroner.

When the automobile in which they were riding overturned at Ninth street and Roosevelt boulevard last night, three persons were injured. They are Robert Hawk, Dillingham street, Frankford, the driver; Florence Silk, eighteen, 4900 North Thirteenth street, and Charlotte Schrams, seventeen, 4934 North Warnock street. All were taken to St. Luke's Hospital. Miss Silk insisted on going home, but later went to the Jewish Hospital, suffering from concussion of the brain.

Hawk had swerved the machine sharply to avoid collision with a streetcar, upsetting his machine. He was arrested by police of the Branchtown station.

William Hank, fifteen, 234 Benetz street, was run down by an automobile last night as he passed a garage at Norwood avenue and Benetz street, Chestnut Hill. He was taken to the Chestnut Hill Hospital with a fractured skull. The car driver, Albert Kuebler, 106 West Moreland avenue, was arrested.

David Blank, 2211 North Thirteenth street, was injured when his automobile hit a pole at Broad street and Allegheny avenue last night. He was taken to St. Luke's Hospital.

## NAVAL HOME PLEA FOR CHAPLAIN WON

Order Retiring Beloved Captain Tribou Countermanded by Secretary of Navy

### FIFTY YEARS IN SERVICE

By special order of Secretary Denby Captain David H. Tribou is to remain as chaplain of the Schuylkill Naval Home. The order was received this morning and caused wild joy among 136 residents of the home.

Captain Tribou is seventy-three years old, and fifty-odd years in service. He is long past the age of retirement for officers, but through dispensations of various officials at Washington he has been allowed to continue his duties at the Naval Home. Some weeks ago there came an order placing Captain Tribou on detached duty on the retired list. There was great wrath and consternation among the inmates of the home as to the retention of the chaplain. The chaplain was drawn and signed by the whole 136, and sent to Assistant Secretary Roosevelt. Mr. Roosevelt's reply was that orders were orders.

Well, at that the inmates made a pool of their tobacco money and bought fares to Washington for Charles P. Rowland and Oakley Sillock. These two presented themselves at the office of Secretary Denby, and persisted until an audience was granted them.

"Well, sir," said Mr. Howley this morning, "see up and told him how Cap'n Tribou was the best friend a man ever had around this old place and as how most of us'd as soon leave the home as lose Cap'n Tribou. The Secretary said he might be nice, but he jes' said that he'd give the matter his personal attention and we came back not knowing what'd become of us all."

"Today we're so happy that it looks like some of the old ones is a-goin' to have a heart attack tonight."

"Captain Tribou was appointed by President Grant in 1872. From 1901 to 1910 he was dean of the chaplains' corps, retiring in September, 1910.
