

MEETING CALLED TO PURGE CHESTER

Clean-up of Town Is Up to Good People, Says Ministers' Leader

MAYOR'S AIDE TO SPEAK

"It is up to the good people of Chester to clean their city," said Rev. John Graham, pastor of Bethany Church and chairman of the Civic Committee of the Chester Ministerial Association, today.

"We have called a mass-meeting to be held in the armory next Thursday night," he said, "at which time Edward Bryant, who has been adviser to Mayor Ramsey, will be the principal speaker. Mr. Bryant, I imagine, will have plenty to tell the good people who will attend this meeting. He has already told me that so far he has failed to accomplish anything and that unless he can get the co-operation of the good people of our city he may as well quit. That is why we called this meeting. It is up to the good people of our city to attend. We mean business and will go the limit to clean any condition that exists, but we must have the help of residents to do so. It will be entirely up to those who have to live there. If they do not care how low their city has fallen and will not help to bring it to a point where they can point with civic pride to its cleanliness, that will be up to them.

"They will have an opportunity to voice their approval of our determination to clean up by attending the mass-meeting."

The mass-meeting will probably result in an attempt to oust Chief of Police Davenport. There has been trouble

between Mayor Ramsey and the Chief for several weeks. Mayor Ramsey, when he retained Mr. Bryant as his adviser, called upon Chief Davenport to resign. Chief Davenport refused to resign, and backed his refusal with the announcement that he was going to stay to the finish and advised the Mayor to fight his own battles.

Davenport is backed by the McClure system, which has the bulk of the power in the Police Committee of Councils, and unless he is advised by his supporters in the councilmanic committee to resign Chief Davenport will not get.

The committee appointed at the meeting of the Ministerial Association to call the mass-meeting consists of the Rev. Mr. Graham, chairman; the Rev. A. L. Latham, of the Third Presbyterian Church; the Rev. C. Lee Gaul, pastor of the Trinity Methodist Episcopal Church, and the Rev. John I. Meek, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church.

MUM'S THE WORD IN PENN LIBRARY

Students Who Believe in Signs Will Keep Silence in Sacred Precincts

NEW SECTION IS OPENED

The library of the University of Pennsylvania is to be rich in the gold of silence, if the University authorities can manage it. One of the innovations which returning students found this year was a sign in the library which read:

"Conversation cannot be permitted in this room. If your neighbors disturb you point out this sign to them. If this is ineffective call the attention of one of the library staff."

This rather makes the library taboo

as a place of social activity. Last year conversation of average volume was allowed in the hall and quiet conversation in the outer reading room. It was only beyond the sacred portals of the inner reading-room that speech was enjoined altogether. In the alcove under the stairs co-eds were wont to assemble to discuss their various "crushes" and lay the backgrounds for new ones.

One tier in the new stack of the library has been opened, and the geological and astronomical libraries have been moved from their respective departments into the main library building. The library now shelters about 460,000 books. About 100,000 more are scattered through the libraries of various departments.
