

## GENERAL CARTER RETIRES

Chief of Military Bureau Quits After

Thirty-nine Years' Service

Washington, Oct. 1.—Brigadier General Jesse Mcl Carter, chief of the War Department's Military Bureau, retired from active service today at his own request. He had served thirty-nine years having been appointed to West Point Sept. 1, 1882.

General Carter, as Military Bureau Chief, directed the organization of the United States Guards to safeguard untilities and industries after mobilization of State forces for war in 1917. He was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal for this work. After the war he directed the reorganization of the National Guard.
