

CRUISER TO BRING 'UNKNOWN SOLDIER'

Hero Who Fell in France to Be Buried in Arlington Cemetery

FOCH TO DECORATE TOMB

By the Associated Press. Paris, Oct. 4.—America's "unknown soldier," who will find honored sepulchre in the National Cemetery at Arlington, Va., will be selected by a non-commissioned officer from the American Expeditionary Force on the Rhine at Chalons-sur-Marne on the morning of October 21. The body will leave Havre late on the evening of October 25 on board the United States cruiser Olympia.

medal and the war cross at Arlington Cemetery on November 11, when the body will be buried.

General Allen has taken the most complete precautions to insure the selection of a body which is impossible of identification. The bodies of four unidentified soldiers, one from each of the four prominent American cemeteries in France, will be assembled near the railway station at Chalons-sur-Marne. They will be unidentified men who fell in the American fighting zone.

One noncommissioned officer from each unit of the American forces in Germany will act as escort, the number not exceeding twenty-four, and six American privates will be pall-bearers. A noncommissioned officer selected by General Allen will then be ordered to place his hand on one of the four coffins. The one chosen will immediately be taken to Havre on a special train. The remaining three bodies will be buried in the Romagne cemetery.

After the ceremony at Havre the body will be placed in the keeping of the American navy, which will deliver it to the American army at New York. The date of the Olympia's arrival at New York is uncertain, but will probably be November 4 or 5.

The decision of the Washington authorities not to have any ceremony take place at Paris was reached out of consideration for the French Government. The American Government took the view that it would too closely follow the Sunday's ceremony in Paris, when General Pershing presented the medal of honor voted by Congress to France's unknown soldier, again involving elaborate preparation by France.

STOLEN GROS GEMS FOUND ON RAILROAD

\$40,000 Jewels Belonging to Wife of American Physician of Paris Picked Up on Tracks

SHE AND HUSBAND HERE

Dr. and Mrs. E. L. Gros, of Paris, France, in Philadelphia on their way home after a visit to the Southwest, were informed today that jewels worth \$40,000, lost by Mrs. Gros on a trans-continental train, had been recovered at De Soto, Mo.

Dr. Gros is the famous American physician who has charge of the hospital in Paris known as the American Ambulance, which from the beginning of the World War maintained a hospital at Neuilly which became famous for the expert treatment given great numbers of wounded.

Dr. and Mrs. Gros were on their way to Philadelphia from Dallas, Tex., when the jewels were lost. It is believed they were stolen by a thief who threw them from the train, planning to pick them up later.

The jewels were in a small black leather bag, which Mrs. Gros had taken with her into the dining car. They were missed and search made for them throughout the train, but without result.

The jewels, according to an Associated Press dispatch, were taken from the train by Perry Anderson, who keeps a billiard room at De Soto.

Anderson was walking along the tracks when he saw a leather bag, and out of curiosity picked it up and opened it. He was dazzled with the sight of the rich jewels it contained. He told the local police of his find, and from a description telegraphed broadcast out of the jewels by Mrs. Gros, they were recognized as her property.

Dr. and Mrs. Gros arrived here Saturday and went for a brief visit to the home of Charles E. Patton, at Woodgrove. Today Dr. and Mrs. Gros came to Philadelphia, where they are staying at a Broad street hotel. They will leave in a few days for New York, to return to Paris.
