

RELIEVE WALNUT ST. JAM, P. R. T.'S AIM

Asks Commission to Permit Tracks on Sansom Between 20th and 21st Streets

O. K.'D BY CITY ENGINEERS

Permission to lay tracks on Sansom street between Twentieth and Twenty-second, eventually to form a line upon which cars will be run during the rush hours to relieve congestion on Walnut street, was asked by the P. R. T. of the Public Service Commission today.

Joining with the traction company is the Sansom Street Connecting Railway Company, an underlying corporation of the P. R. T., formed to function with this particular purpose.

In making application before Chairman W. D. R. Ames, of the commission, counsel for the P. R. T. said with the laying of tracks between Twentieth and Twenty-second, a continuous line would be formed between Eighth and Twenty-second. He said city engineers had already passed upon the construction work.

Permission was also asked for laying of tracks on Myrtle and Locust streets, in Germantown, by a joint petition of the P. R. T. and the Germantown Loop Railway Company. This, too, is an underlying company of the P. R. T.

The Pocumoke was seized last July as a run-runner. Roberts is being held as a witness for the Department of Justice. He was transferred Monday to the Gloucester immigrant detention station.

The big sailor, who is six feet three and a West Indian, hasn't worn shoes for eleven years. But the cold floors of the detention house has turned his long stride into a shiversy glide. Immigration officials intend to have a pair of shoes made to order for him.

ADMITS FORGERIES, BLAMES LOST BETS

Former Prosperous Business Man Says He Lost All in Playing the Races

GETS FIVE YEARS IN PRISON

When money saved for a home had been lost on horse races, Howard S. Brooks, once a prosperous business man, told Judge Monaghan today, he

tried to recoup his losses through bogus checks. Brooks was sentenced to five years in the County Prison. Brooks lived at 3417 Longshore street with his wife and eighteen-month-old child. He formerly was manager for the National Textile Company. He is said to have victimized his employers by forging checks. Brooks pleaded guilty to making a bogus check on a trust company in his city September 10. The check was in the name of G. Y. Clement and called for \$450. Brooks sent a messenger boy to the bank with the check and a letter instructing him to bring the cash to Tenth and Chestnut streets. Bank officials became suspicious and made up a dummy package. The messenger could not find Brooks at the rendezvous. The next day Brooks wrote a letter of complaint to the telegraph company, and the messenger was sent again with the fake package. Brooks was arrested as he took the package from the boy.
