President Asks Journalists to Work for Success of Disarming Conference

#### PROGRAM IS ANNOUNCED

By the Associated Press. Honolulu, Oct. 12.—The formal opening of the Press Congress of the World annual convention here yesterday was marked by the reading of a message from President Harding by W. R. Farrington, Governor of Hawaii. The President in his communication expressed a hope that the public press throughout the world would direct its efforts to promote international understanding and, particularly, to make clear to the task of the delegates to the disarmament conference. He urged the press to be in a position to give a full and beneficial influence.

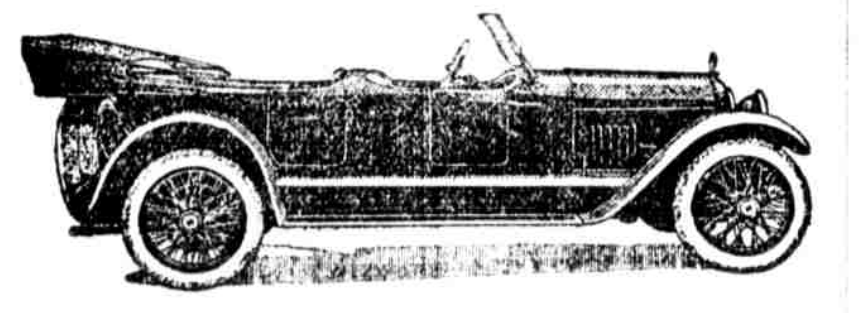

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### LEAGUE'S SILESIAN MAP COMPROMISE

Germany and Poland Each Get Two and a Half Districts. BETWEEN 2 SFORZA LINES. London, Oct. 12.—Division of the plebiscite district of Upper Silesia along a line representing a compromise between the Italian Minister of Foreign Affairs has been decided upon by the Council of the League of Nations.

It is said that the districts of Gliwice, H. Silesia, and part of the district of Katowice will go to Germany under the terms of the resolution of the League of Nations. The districts of Koesel, and the remaining districts will go to Poland.

### PERSHING SETS DAY TO BESTOW MEDAL

Will Visit Westminster Abbey October 17 if Agreeable to British. GENERAL IN AMIABLE MOOD. Paris, Oct. 12.—General Pershing has accepted the British Government's invitation to assist in the presentation of the Congressional Medal of Honor to the "Unknown Warrior" of Great Britain in Westminster Abbey. It is probable the ceremony will take place next Monday.

In transmitting his tentative acceptance through Ambassador Harvey in London, General Pershing has asked Mr. Harvey to take up the matter with the British Foreign Office and War Office, saying if October 17 is an agreeable date to the British Government he will be glad to go to London on that day, enjoining an engagement he had made in this city.

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### GIRL SENT TO STATE HOME

Pleas Guilty to Larceny Charge and Gets Indeterminate Sentence. Atlantic City, Oct. 12.—Mrs. Beatrice Armbuster, who recently figured in a Camp Dix hold-up, today was taken to the State Home for Girls at Trenton, where she was sent for an indeterminate sentence by Judge Robert H. Ingersoll.

The girl, who is only nineteen years old, several months ago was found in a woods in Camden County literally covered with mosquitoes. She was taken to a hospital. Later a soldier was placed on trial on a charge of having helped up a jitney driver on one of the Camden County roads. Mrs. Armbuster was wanted in court to give testimony, but refused to leave the hospital. Finally the officers wrapped her in a blanket, placed her on a stretcher and took her forcibly into court to testify.

### PENNSY PULLMAN FLIER IN CRASH AT LEWISTOWN

None Hurt When Three Cars Are Derailed by Hitting Wrecked Freight Train. Lewistown, Pa., Oct. 12.—The Pennsylvania Railroad, plowed into a freight train in front of the Lewistown passenger station at 12:24 o'clock this morning. The locomotive, club car and two sleepers were derailed, but remained upright on the roadbed, parallel with the rails. Passengers and crew escaped injury.

The crew of the wrecked locomotive, Engineer I. A. Shatto and Fireman Heisey, of Harrisburg, took charge of the relief locomotive, taking their train into the terminal at Altoona. A fast mail train, wrecked two cars loaded with lumber, which were thrown across the passenger track in the face of the train without warning. The wreck occurred on a sharp curve where trains have a speed limit of twenty-five miles an hour, and to this, the cause was probably due the absence of a signal.
