

REVISION DEFEAT NOT FAIR EXAMPLE

Many Voters Did Not Understand Detailed Provisions, Research Bureau Says

SETS FORTH ITS VIEWS

Defeat of the proposed constitutional convention at the September election does not mean a majority of voters were actually hostile to the question, in the belief of the Bureau of Municipal Research.

In a detailed bulletin showing various influences and forces brought to bear upon voters, the bureau says, primarily the defeat was due to the fact the voter was not free to vote just on or against the constitution but had to vote on a particular legislative program containing detailed provisions.

The bulletin says: "Among the reasons was the requirement twenty-five of the 1917 constitution to the Governor. This one constitutional provision cost the proposition thousands of votes. Besides, many voters seemed to think they were voting in the election of a new constitution, not a few State Department received numbers of letters asking for copies of the new Constitution to be voted on. Other voters were influenced by the report of the Governor's Commission on Constitutional Amendment and Revision, which had recommended only 120 changes in the Constitution, but the text of a proposed new constitution, substituting them."

The Governor has announced his desire for the power to appoint twenty-five delegates was due to his wish to appoint the twenty-five members of the commission, so that the state might have the benefit of their previous study.

There was a hostile vote, to be sure; a combination of the votes of various small groups, some of them very powerful politically, such with a particular interest to serve. But constitutional revision was defeated because many of its strongest friends found themselves unable to support the particular measure on the ballot.
