

### SKIPPER HERE SAW BODIES OF VIKINGS

Captain Apold Tells of Finding Bodies Centuries Old in Frozen North

#### LIKE SLEEPING WARRIORS

Shades of the ancient Vikings, of faces most hairy and the very stars of the salt-tanned sea rovers, visions of the striped sails of the historic Viking ships, and blossoms of the compassing fleets that swept across the seas to the Far Northland coasts, are, indeed, in the cabin of the steamship *Vesta*, which docked here yesterday from Greenland, as Captain Apold tells a tale revealing the most thrilling pages of "The Frozen North."

The story was of the unearthing of wonderfully preserved bodies of Vikings from frozen graves in Greenland, where for probably more than 1000 years they had rested secure from possible decay and the maddening enigma of countless generations in the wake of civilization. The discovery was made by exploring physicians who had been sent to Egedes, Greenland, by the Danish Government to attend the families of kyleite miners in that vicinity.

Proceeding from kyleite mining to kyleite, the bodies were encased in a mass of frozen snow. They, indeed, were frozen, they appeared but a short time dead. Unlike the annals of ancient Egypt, the forms and flesh of these Vikings were not shrunken nor wasted. Rather did they seem as in a peaceful sleep, lying at full length, wearing their coats of mail and winged leggings, and grasping their war javelins. They had all the appearance of warriors, carrying a short rest following a battle.

Captain Apold, who sailed for this port shortly after the discovery, leaves further excursions will be started immediately and undoubtedly much will be learned before long of the ancient customs of the country, of the men and women whose descendants have been swept out or absorbed by the Eskimo population.

### N. J. FARE DECISION MAY BE APPEALED

Camden Riders Will Stick to Buses Which Operate on 7-Cent Basis, Is Belief

#### OTHER CITIES TO FIGHT

Doubt that the people will pay the increased street car fares in Camden while the jitneys continue the seven-cent rate was expressed yesterday by E. G. O'Connell, city council member in discussing yesterday's decision by the Public Utilities Commission.

"I cannot see how the Public Utilities Commission can expect the people to pay a greater rate of fare in face of their competition," said Mr. O'Connell. "I understand the cities in the State will carry the question to the higher Federal courts."

In Camden the buses, which operate on a schedule almost as exact as the street cars, charge the seven-cent rate, and if they do not go up in fares with the Public Service Railway Company it is difficult to see why the people should use the trolleys. The other 140 municipalities affected by the decision of the Public Utilities Commission are not all as well served as Camden, but many of them have a right to be competitive against the street cars.

The Public Service Railway Company was authorized yesterday to put the eight-cent rate into effect temporarily in a decision written by Judge Woodcock of Holmdel. The opinion was concurred in by Judge Rollstab, of New Jersey. Judge Davis, of New Jersey, filed a dissenting opinion.




