

WIFE SUES, SAYING BARON FOOLED HER

Stage Beauty Denies He Was in Financial Difficulties at the Time of Separation

DIAMOND-A-DAY BRIDE

New York, Oct. 17.—One of ancient Italy's noblest sons and, moreover, one of her greatest in worldly coin, and goods, the Baron de Hollub, is in difficulty. His third wife is suing him for a substantial part of his estate.

But not so, says the wife, "because my husband fooled me. He told me he was in financial straits when I got him. But I found out. Now I see that the \$50,000 in money and the \$50,000 in jewelry and the \$20,000 in cars was a mere pittance in proportion to his wealth at that time. And now, after the war, he is much wealthier than before. I prove this in my papers."

The third wife of the Baroness is the beautiful actress, Harriette Loraine, who has sailed the Atlantic thirty-six times and who has a record for making her dream come true.

Tells Story of Her Romance

Twin Stowaways Deported

RESCUE ABDUCTED BRITON

U. S. Troops in Santo Domingo Force Rebels to Release English Citizen
Washington, Oct. 17.—The release of Thomas J. Steele, a British citizen resident in the San Pedro Macoris district of Santo Domingo, who was kidnapped and held for ransom by alleged Santo Domingo "patriots" on September 28, was effected by the prompt action of a detachment of United States marines, it was learned here yesterday. The Dominicans were forced to abandon Steele during a hot pursuit, and he was returned to his home uninjured within forty-eight hours after his capture. The marines captured forty-eight members of the band in the pursuit.

Altoona Has Emergency Strike Plan

Altoona, Pa., Oct. 17.—At the office of the superintendent of the Middle Division yesterday, an official said: "We have had for years an emergency program to be followed out, but it applies to fires, floods, wrecks, as well as strikes. We always keep that organization up to date, but no special action has been taken. If some of the shompen should strike, such repair work as cannot be done here will be turned over to the private concerns."

GREEK ASSEMBLY SUPPORTS PREMIER

Declares Army Occupies Six Times the Territory Given by Treaty in Asia Minor

WAR MINISTER IS STRUCK

Athens, Oct. 17.—The Gounaris government received a vote of confidence from the National Assembly Saturday in spite of the threats of the opposition. The Government incurred no real danger as the opposition under Nicholas Stratos was small and the Venizelists refused to support it, owing to his distrust of Stratos. Premier Gounaris in his speech said that Greece occupied in Asia Minor more than six times as much territory as was allotted by the Sevres treaty. While the vote was being taken

Celoid M. Drossopoulos, retired, struck M. Theotokis, the Minister of War, with a cane. The Minister was not hurt very badly, and Drossopoulos was ejected from the house.
Turkish Nationalist forces on the northern end of the battle zone in Asia Minor have been driven back, following a serious attack upon the Greek right wing, says an official statement issued here. Heavy losses were inflicted upon the enemy, it is asserted, at the other end of the front, near Afium-Karahissar, Greek airplanes have bombarded enemy concentrations.

Riga, Oct. 17.—Yussuf Kemal Bey, the Turkish Nationalist Foreign Minister, has sent the Russian Soviet Government an official complaint against what he calls new Greek atrocities, according to the Rosta agency. He charges that the Greek troops, among other things, are burning people alive in the villages which the Nationalists were forced to evacuate in September.

Young Woman Killed by Auto

Deep River, Conn., Oct. 17.—Miss Iva Looby, twenty-five years old, was killed last night when she was struck by an automobile. The machine was traveling at high speed and did not stop. The State police started an investigation.

ARMS DELEGATION SAILS

Tremendous Crowd Bids Godspeed as Japanese Embark
Yokohama, Oct. 15 (delayed).—There was a tremendous crowd at the pier to bid farewell to the armament conference delegation to Washington. Old residents of the city said they had never witnessed a greater occasion. Floral arches spanned the route of the delegates along the pier to the steamer. When the steamer moved out from the pier there was deafening cheering for many minutes, while bands played the national anthem. The run from Tokio to Yokohama was made by a special train in thirty minutes. Twelve cars were loaded with Japanese who desired to bid the delegation farewell. Many of them were on the station platform an hour before the departure of the train. Among those in the station were many members of the Diplomatic Corps.

The newspapers say that the delegation to Washington carries with it the disarmament policy of the Japanese Government, formulated by the Cabinet Council and approved by the Advisory Council. A copy of these instructions was handed today to the American Ambassador.

NICARAGUAN REBELS LOSE

Six Killed, Many Wounded—Force Is Fleeing Toward Honduras
Managua, Oct. 17.—Nicaraguan Government forces have been victorious in a five-hour engagement with revolutionists in the Department of Nueva Segovia, near the Honduran frontier. Six revolutionists were killed, a large number were wounded and several prisoners and a large quantity of ammunition were captured. The Government forces, although outnumbered three to one, lost only three killed.

The encounter occurred Saturday, nine miles from San Marcos de Colon, Honduras. The revolutionists are said to be fleeing toward Honduras, committing depredations. Protest has been made by the Government of Honduras that Honduran political exiles are fighting in the ranks of the Nicaraguan forces.
