American Flying Ace, After Excitement and Service, Seeks Prohibition Job

PAY SMALL, MUCH ACTION

By a Staff Correspondent Washington, Oct. 20.—A stammering flier rolled up in front of prohibition enforcement headquarters. It gave a convulsive jerk, stuttered, hiccupped, sneezed twice and stopped.

Expected to Accept

That is, he may if he wishes, for he hasn't accepted the job. He left the impression that he will. But he wants to think it over. If after a few days' consideration, it still looks good and there is a prospect for action, he will take the oath and go on the job.

Excitement May Lure The best answer available was that he isn't doing anything just now, that civilian life has proved tame after the war, and that the pursuit of bootleggers promises action and excitement.

Lighting another cigarette he cranked up the flier and careened off down P street, to lose himself in the traffic. Thaw's decision will be rendered within a week. He virtually accepted the appointment on the spot, but left a small loophole for escape. He first wants to be sure about the action. If the bootleggers are going to surrender, that's one thing. If it looks like war, with a chance for a fight, that's another.

Kato, head of the group, corrected what he said was a misunderstanding regarding Japan's naval plans. The Admiral declared that Japan was not, as has been reported, rushing completion of naval vessels while at the same time sending a delegation to Washington denouncing limitation of armaments.

WOMAN WHO LOST 4 IN WAR TO VISIT CITY

English War Widow and Mother, Taking Vreath to Washington, Will Stop Here

CEREMONY IS PLANNED

Mrs. Julia McCudden, British mother, who lost her husband and three sons in the war, will stop in this city on her way to Washington to lay a wreath upon the grave of America's unknown hero.

The ceremony will take place Armistice Day, and the wreath comes in the name of the British people. Mrs. McCudden will leave Liverpool October 28, on the Metagna. She will be accompanied by her daughter, Miss Kathleen McCudden, and will be escorted by Captain A. H. Stevens, Lieutenant F. J. Kersley and Lieutenant Gordon Stuart Ellam.

Others will be taken as potted plants, the blooms to be plucked just before assembling the wreath. Still others are to be sent as "dead flowers," which will be buried when placed in water.
