

THIEF LOOTS SAFE OF \$2900; LOCKS IT

Crackman Scores Using Jimmy or "Soup" in Visit to Sharp & Co.'s Office

GETS \$700. REST IN CHECKS

An expert safe cracker, who solved the combination of Abraham Sharp & Co.'s safe at the southeast corner of Fifty-third street and Baltimore avenue last night, stole \$2200 in checks and \$700 in cash.

Abraham Sharp & Co. conduct an automobile agency. July 1 a year ago their place was entered in the same manner and their safe robbed by solving the combination, just as last night. In that instance the robber got \$500. Payment has been stopped on the checks.

The crackman entered the place without using a "Jimmy," just as he opened the safe without resorting to the moss and noise "soup," as the crooks call nitroglycerin. He opened a side door on Fifty-third street with a skeleton key, and crept through a partition window into the office where the safe stood.

After robbing the safe he methodically closed and locked it again. The office had been so little disturbed by the nocturnal visitor that no one suspected a robbery had taken place until the safe was opened by the head of the firm this morning.

Police were called immediately, and district detectives made a careful ex-

amination of the office to learn if the crackman, in spite of his cleverness, had left a clue behind him. Apparently he had worked with gloves, for no finger prints were found on the steel door or about the combination.

Even the door leading to the street had been carefully closed by the robber when he went out. The window between the outer and inner office, left open, and some streaks of dust where he had clambered over the sill and across a desk, told the detectives the manner in which he had entered.

The police theory is the robbery was committed by one of the experts of the profession, who happened on the automobile agency during the summer of 1920, found the safe "easy" and made a note of it for a "return engagement," which he "pulled" last night.

Police are checking up through their underground channels of information to learn what safe-cracking experts are known to have been in Philadelphia the last few days.

ELMWOOD TENANT LOSES RENT FIGHT

Superior Court Upholds Eviction of Man Who Refused to Pay Increase

OLD LEASE DECLARED GOOD

An evicted tenant lost a test case today, growing out of the controversy between landlords and tenants in the

Elmwood section, following rent increases. In this instance Judge Linn, in the Superior Court, decided in favor of the landlord, affirming the ruling of Judge Shoemaker in the lower court.

Charles F. Eggleston, the landlord, took title to a house from the United States Shipping Board. The tenant, James Vivian, a former Hog Island worker, refused to pay increased rent. He was evicted. He asked the lower court to strike off the judgment of eviction, was refused, and appealed.

Judge Linn, in his opinion, points out that the landlord served due notice on Vivian, terminating the lease, and that the judgment appears to be regular.

Vivian, when the lease was first made, was a Hog Island worker. His lease reads: "The term under this lease shall cease and determine immediately upon the termination of the present employment of the lessee." Vivian left the shipyard in July, 1920, and contended

the effect of his leaving, under the clause, rendered the lease void, and the new landlord had no right to invoke any of its clauses to get him out.
