

DEFENDS PURPOSE OF VAN NESS ACT

Ex-Governor Stokes Declares It Does Not Deny Right of Jury Trial

COVERS MINOR CASES ONLY

Asbury Park, Nov. 2.—Former Governor E. C. Stokes, speaking as State chairman of the New Jersey Republican State Committee, before the county organization of Monmouth County, at a dinner held in the Coleman House today, said the Republicans had not been a party to the denial of trial by jury in liquor violations, and that the Van Ness Act was also not a party to the denial of trial by jury where offenses against the liquor laws were serious.

He said the Van Ness Act simply provides that its violators should be punishable under the Disorderly Act, and that act does not provide for a jury trial, because it only covers petty offenses. Under it no person can be sent to a Federal prison, nor can he be incarcerated in the county jail for a longer term than six months therefor, the Van Ness Act simply covers minor infractions of law.

"Under the Van Ness Act, where a man can be sent to a Federal prison for a year or two or three years," he added, "the right of trial by jury still obtains, so that the act does not deprive anyone of the right of trial by jury is not denied where the offense is regarded as serious and punishable therefor. The Van Ness Act, therefore, only covering minor offenses, does not deny trial by jury."

"You may not like the Eighteenth Amendment. That is no reason for its violation. If that were so, you could have the right to violate the anti-liquor laws, because it was not one of the really haven't any nation who are dry."

ITALY'S 'UNKNOWN' IS LYING IN STATE

King and Peasant Alike Pay Homage to Symbol of 500,000 Dead

WILL BE BURIED FRIDAY

Rome, Nov. 2.—Solemn reverence by King and peasant was paid to Italy's unknown soldier, symbol of her 500,000 dead, when the body arrived in Rome this morning and was transported on a gun carriage to the church of Santa Maria degli Angeli. It will there lie in state until its final interment on Friday in the "star of the country," under the Victor Emmanuel Monument.

The train bearing the body arrived in a suburb of Rome last night, being met by the Mayor and members of the Municipal Council. The cars of the train were virtually filled with floral tributes to the unknown soldier, more than 500 wreaths having been placed aboard by the authorities of nearly 100 towns through which the train had passed on its trip from Aquila, northeast of Venice, to Rome.

Delegations of former soldiers and local organizations also sent flowers, which were placed in the cars. Crowds numbering many thousands gathered at many stations or along the railroad, either preserving a reverent silence or waving flags and singing patriotic songs.

This morning the car was brought to the Central Station in this city, and the King and Queen, with the King's children and the Queen's children, and other members of the royal household, stood with bowed heads as the coffin, draped in the tricolor, was carried from the train on the shoulders of eight valorous non-commissioned officers to the waiting gun carriage.

Members of the royal household, princes and princesses, Ministers of State, Senators and Deputies, the general staffs of the army and navy, crippled veterans, widows and mothers, all united in silent honor for the dead.

The cortege was formed in the station entrance, and between lines of soldiers at present arms proceeded to the church, which was but three blocks away. The route was filled with a number of crowds.

The heavy gun carriage laden with the symbol of a nation's grief drawn by eight artillery chargers rolled heavily along the line of the cortege. By its side walked an escort of honor, the little more than a score of men decorated with Italy's highest military honor, the Gold Medal for Valor. These were Italy's living bravest.

Little Prospect of Settlement of Strike—Truck Drivers Are Stunned

CLEVELAND ALSO IS HIT

New York, Nov. 2.—Citizens of the metropolitan area rose again this morning to breakfast without milk and cream on the second day of the milk handlers' strike, with small prospect of a strike settlement in sight.

Except for deliveries by small distributing companies the milk delivery system continued in a state of paralysis. Representatives of the employers' organization, the Milk Conference Board and Milk Wagon Drivers' Union were called to the office of Mayor Hylan this morning to discuss possible terms of settlement. Both sides expressed little hope of reaching a settlement.

The employers, in reply to a request by Mayor Hylan to arbitrate the demands of the drivers for a \$5 weekly increase and two weeks' vacation with pay, in case today's negotiation failed, refused, asserting any arbitration must include the questions of an open-shop policy and a reduction of wages provided by the contract, which expired on November 1. They reiterated their intention of establishing the open shop.
