A crowd of 15,000 rabid fans swarmed Deven's Field, Oxford Pike near the high school, this afternoon when the kick-off was made starting the big game between the Yellowjackets and Holmesburg for the independent football championship of the Northeast section. Hundreds of other fans were packed along the pike waiting to get into the field, while others were scurrying along other farways to get to the park in time to see the kick-off.

Two bands were on hand to supply entertainment during the big game. "Ship" Royal's "Yellowjackets" Band and the most conspicuous with its jazzy tunes and sorrowful lyrics. The first named were intended to put pep into the team and the latter to entertain the visitors.

A large sign reading "Holmesburg, Champions of Philadelphia" was erected on the visitors' side of the field, which was recognized by the supporters of Holmesburg.

Frankford's aggressive play looked to be in the best center and spirits that they had appeared in this season. The "Big Burg" eleven also appeared confident, but not as much as the Yellowjackets.

Records of the rivals show that Holmesburg has not been beat by Frankford for sixteen years. Prior to that time Frankford was the first independent eleven in the United States.

TROCADERO TO BE SOLD; HOUSED FAMOUS STARS

Theatre Dating Back to Civil War on Auction Block Next Week

After an eventful career, which dates back to Civil War times, the Trocadero Theatre, Tenth and Arch streets, is to be sold at auction.

Announcement was made today by Samuel F. Freeman and Co., auctioneers, that the sub would take place next Wednesday, at noon, at their establishment, 1519-21 Chestnut street.

Many stage stars of prominence first began their careers in this playhouse, which has been known by many different names since its existence. Among others who first courted fame there are Raymond W. Brundage, then a member of the Wilbur Opera Company, who became the well-known minstrel; Dock Stader, the well-known minstrel; Lou Simmonds and others, who have since bowed to the final curtain.

Since its opening, the theatre, then known as the Arch Street Opera House, was destroyed by fire, in 1872. On being rebuilt it was occupied by Simmonds and Slemons Minstrel, which had a success for several seasons. Later it was occupied as the home of the Jeanne Winston Company, where comic operas of the day were produced.

When the comic opera faded out the playhouse took the name of the Continental, and presented melodrama of the old-fashioned kind.

About twenty years ago burlesque was started at Princeton and changed its name to the Trocadero. With this form of amusement it prospered better than any time in its career.

The theatre was sold by the Wilmington Trust Co., which represented the Progressive Amusement Company, on February 3, 1917.

TO PROBE BERLIN FINANCES

Reparations Commission to Go to Germany Next Week

Paris, Nov. 5.—(By A. P.)—The reparations commission, including the French and American members for the United States, will leave for Berlin next Monday or Tuesday.

The commission will remain in the German capital two or three weeks to investigate measures by which Germany may procure the necessary funds to meet the payment of 500,000,000 gold marks, due to the Allies by January 15, 1922. It will investigate the cause for the recent depreciation in the value of the German mark.

Brickley arrived here last evening and immediately went to the St. James Hotel, where the team will make its headquarters while in this city. The players will arrive at 11 o'clock. They had a final workout in New York yesterday afternoon.

Heinie Miller, of the Quakers, led his men out early this morning at the Cavalry Armory for a final rehearsal. Heinie is also certain of victory, but admits that it will be the hardest game of the season for his men. Miller does not think so much of Coaldale, despite the fact that the Quakers only defeated the up-staters by a single safety.

What is considered one of the features of the contest is a drop-kicking contest prior to the start of the game between Brickley, Stefan Coffell, and Johnny Scott. Coffell was considered the best in the West when he was with Notre Dame, and Scott did great work for Lafayette.

Part of the program should prove decidedly interesting. Brickley will kick from the 2-yard line to the 50-yard line, and then turn around and kick in the opposite direction. It will be the first time that many Philadelphia fans have ever seen the noted Harvard star in action.

MORVICH CLASS OF FUTURITY

Philadelphia's Prominent in Throng to See Pimlico \$50,000 Race

CLOSE MARYLAND CONTESTS

Pimlico Race Track, Nov. 5.—Through from Philadelphia and New York added to the large crowd arriving at the Pimlico course today to witness the first running of the Maryland Futurity, the richest purse ever offered in America for two-year-olds being the prize, there being \$40,000 added by the association, the total amount, including \$1000 for each horse entered, constituting a purse of about \$53,000 all told.

A track not fast, but drying out rapidly, appears to be in store for the large field of juveniles carded to start. The unbeaten Morvich, by Runnymede-Hymir, rules as the overwhelming choice. Miss Joy, believed by horsemen to be the equal if not the superior of the block out, was retired in Kentucky for the season after having been injured in the running of the Lexington Futurity. Startle, another likely contender from Kentucky, could not be entered when she developed fever after her trip from the South. St. Henry, owned by Montfort Jones, who also owns Miss Joy, came in for a large share of consideration in his country's closest contender, Runnantel, like Morvich, a Runnymede California-bred colt, also was considered to have a call for a part of the purse.

Morvich has done everything asked of him, winning ten straight races, all in high-class fields. On May 6 he won the Suffolk stakes at Jamaica, on May 16, the Greenford Selling stakes, also at Jamaica. These two races netted \$3575. Next at Aqueduct he won a \$1250 purse; July 2, a \$800 purse; a purse of \$821 at Laurier City he annexed a purse of \$1212; then at Saratoga the United States Hotel Handicap, worth \$9075; the Saratoga Special, \$30,500; and the Saratoga Hopeful Stakes at Saratoga worth \$21,900 net. He was taken to Havre de Grace on September 21 and won the Eastern Shore Handicap, \$7100. Some record for a two-year-old which the breeders did not regard as his best youngster. But, with all his successes, Morvich cannot be compared with Man o' War in his two-year-old form, nor any other horse for that matter, in the last decade, in his history.
