DID you know that the Overseas Legion of Women from this city will go to Washington on Friday for the ceremonies at Arlington? You know, Mrs. Oswald Chew is president of the legion here, and pretty much every woman who saw service on the other side belongs to it. They will be represented in a body at the ceremonies, and, I understand, a great many are going down. It's impressive how many Philadelphia women are taking part in the ceremonies at Arlington for the winter.

Some of the Philadelphia Overseas women are Mrs. Edward Biddle Halsey, Letty McKim, Rachel Baker, Frances Clark, Julia Williamson, Rebekah Elliot, Sophie Norris, Eleanor Bligham, Esther Lloyd, Myra Elliot, Rose Dolan and ever so many others.

WHILE on the subject of the ceremonies on Friday at Arlington, you heard about the Belleau Wood Memorial Association and what it is endeavoring to do? I think it's a splendid thing. Mrs. Langford, who is president of the association, as well as vice president of the Navy League of the United States. In this city, Mrs. Charles M. Lea is chairman and Mrs. Theodore Reath, whose son, Bob Reath, fell at Belleau Wood, is vice chairman. The aim of the association is to rebuild the village of Belleau as a memorial to our marines and infantrymen who died there.

It is hoped that the full amount of money needed will have been raised by Friday, so that it will be possible to start a purse containing the necessary amount to President Harding at Arlington after the ceremonies of the Unknown Dead on Friday.

Many of us who have near and dear ones over there near Belleau Wood, have been glad indeed to contribute to this memorial, which will be a small way of showing our love for the boys who gave their lives for their country and whose magnificent fighting put fear and dread into the German Army, once more trying to reach the Rhine. Mr. Theodore Reath, Bob's father, has written the following forward which was sent out with the circulars explaining the situation:

"The village of Belleau is in view from the American Cemetery on the western edge of Belleau Wood. Also the name will ever be associated with the fighting of the A. E. F. at one of the crises of the Great War. As in the case of the First Division at Chateau Thierry, so two regiments of United States Infantry and two of marines fell and then drove back the Germans at Belleau. These circumstances make appropriate and will stimulate American interest in rebuilding the village as almost a part of the surroundings of the cemetery and as a memorial.

Moreover, the plan adopted by Mrs. Frazier and her co-workers, by which the contributions to the fund will be widely distributed and made in very small sums, is well conceived for the admirable purpose of stimulating the real patriotic interest of our citizenship. The universal military service under the Selective Service Act of Congress gave every one immediate interest in doing our part toward winning the war. Perhaps no single factor did so much to crystallize the patriotic effort of the country and the accompanying was correspondingly glorious. The present project has the same virtue in lesser degree of stirring and preserving the patriotic memories of the country."
