COMBINE CARRIES CITY BY 200,000; RENSHAW WINS Kendrick Leads Ticket by 217,771 on Complete Count; Amos Scott Is Elected by Vares

WARE SLATE HIT IN ONLY ONE SPOT BY INDEPENDENTS
Every Republican Candidate Goes Into Office by Huge Totals

WOMEN FAILED TO RALLY TO SUPPORT OF LEAGUE
A listless election which fell short by more than 70,000 of the vote polled last year by Harding seated the hand-picked candidates of the Combine in five county offices yesterday without any of them knowing they had been in a scrap.

The Republican plurality ran from 200,000 to 217,771, a striking contrast to the county election of November, 1917, when the organization squeezed through in a finish that left it victorious but badly frightened.

Receiver of Taxes Kendrick was elected for his third term, polling a higher vote than any of his colleagues on the ticket, 241,285, according to complete returns. In 1917, Kendrick got 114,000 votes, only 4000 more than Thomas F. Armstrong, then the fusion candidate for Receiver of Taxes.

Renshaw Shatters Vares Slate
Even the contest for the election of eleven magistrates was a hand-picked affair with one conspicuous exception. This was the election of Magistrate Benjamin H. Renshaw, a Voters' League candidate, who was given a minority place.

The sixteen other places in the so-called minor judiciary went either to men known as out-and-out followers of the Combine, or to followers of the Democratic city machine which worked hand in glove with the Republican organization.

The 250,000 or more women voters in Philadelphia failed to turn out and elect Miss Katherine K. Foster, Voters' League candidate, and other feminine aspirants for the office of magistrate. The Vares machine elected its entire slate of women, including Amos Scott, saloonkeeper.

The willingness of most of the voters to accept the results of the September primary, when the Combine won all the nominations, was exemplified in the vote polled by Vivian Frank Gable and Edwin Gable.

Mr. Gable, in September was the Voters' League candidate for the Republican nomination for Register of Wills. Yesterday he was the ticket of the Prohibition and Charter nominee for that office.

Mr. Wolf was the Voters' League candidate for the office of City Controller. He was the nominee of the Prohibition Party for that office on the ballot yesterday.

Women Failed to Come Out
A big protest vote against the governing tactics of the Combine was expected to develop, especially among the women voters. Some independents looked for this protest to show itself in a big vote for Gable and Wolf. But Mr. Gable received only 4528 votes. Mr. Wolf, former president of the Board of Education, received only 20,021.

The highest vote polled by any candidate was that of the Republican candidate of Judge Eugene C. Bondwell, Democratic candidate for Justice of the State Supreme Court.
