Kendrick Leads Ticket by 217,771 on Complete Count; Amos Scott Is Elected by Vares

VARE SLATE HIT IN ONLY ONE SPOT BY INDEPENDENTS

Every Republican Candidate Goes Into Office by **Huge Totals**

WOMEN FAILED TO RALLY TO SUPPORT OF LEAGUE

A listless election which fell short more than 70,000 of the vote polled last year by Harding seated the hand-picked candidates of the Combine in five county offices yesterday without any of them knowing they had been in a scrap.

The Republican plurality ran from 200,000 to 217,771, a striking con trast to the county election of November, 1917, when the organi ration squeezed through in a finish that left it victorious but badly frightened.

Receiver of Taxes Kendrick was elected for his third term, polling a higher vote than any of his colleagues on the ticket, 241,285, according to complete returns. In 1917, Kendrick got 114,000 votes, only 4000 more than Thomas F Armstrong, then the fusion candi- PRISONER IS WELL GUARDED
