

DOGS HELP MAN BEAT UP BANDIT

Highwayman Is Downed by Victim and Terriers
Join in Fight

ANOTHER ROBBED OF \$11

Coleman J. Joyce, of 2 East Shoop Street, Germantown, who is not related to the lawyer of the same name, hollered for a square with a Negro highwayman last night, while Mr. Joyce's three Boston bull terriers snatched mouthfuls where they could of the bandit's booty.

The hold-up man finally broke away from his victim, who had lain down, but was out of breath, and ran away. The same man is believed to have held up William Bergmann, 251 West Market Street, on Second Avenue, between 11th and 12th Streets, this evening. He got \$11 from Bergmann, but only a sound beating from Joyce.

"I was walking on my way home in Philadelphia about 10:30 o'clock," said Mr. Joyce. "At Market Street, near Carpenter's Negro inn, he stopped and without a word grabbed me, turned me around and took off. I didn't even have time to get my coat on."

He came back again, and knocked him down again. Joyce got on him and dragged him to 26th Street and Germantown, where he lay in front of the building. He made another lunge at me, after I had been down once more. We wrestled on the ground, and the dogs began barking in the passing darkness. He stood over me, shouting, trying to tear the overcoat from my body. To get at him, I think he has bitten off a toe."

Mr. Joyce is a son of nine. His assailant was a single half-armed and nerveless.

The Rev. Dr. J. Henry Smythe, 83, died Saturday morning at his home, 613 North Taft Avenue, second floor. He was in his eighty-third year.

Fifty-four years ago he became one of the three founders of Belmont M. F. Chapel, now known as Belmont Reformed Church, which was started by breaking out a window.
