Fire Damages Apartment

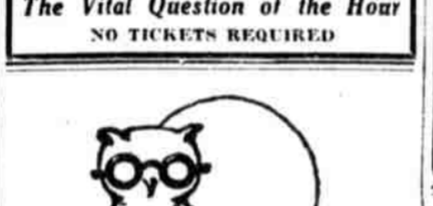
