And it is fitting that it should be so. Marshal Foch is a great man, and we are glad to acknowledge his greatness and to welcome him here.

There are a number of dinners before the Michell dance, and altogether it's going to be a gay and busy day. It's a general holiday, of course, because it is Armistice Day, and has been declared a national holiday by the President, so I am sure both affairs will be great successes.

I HEAR there's going to be a wonderful Russian bazaar at the Emergency Aid on the 30th of November and December 1. It's to be given under the auspices of the Princess Cantacuzene Committee of the Emergency Aid and I hear it's something entirely novel in the way of a fair that has been planned. The atmosphere of Russia is to prevail, coffee will be served from Eastern coffeepots and the samovar will be much in evidence for tea. There will be specimens of Russian work, needlework, personal apparel, enameled boxes and even toys and dolls which have been made and dressed by Russian exiles.
