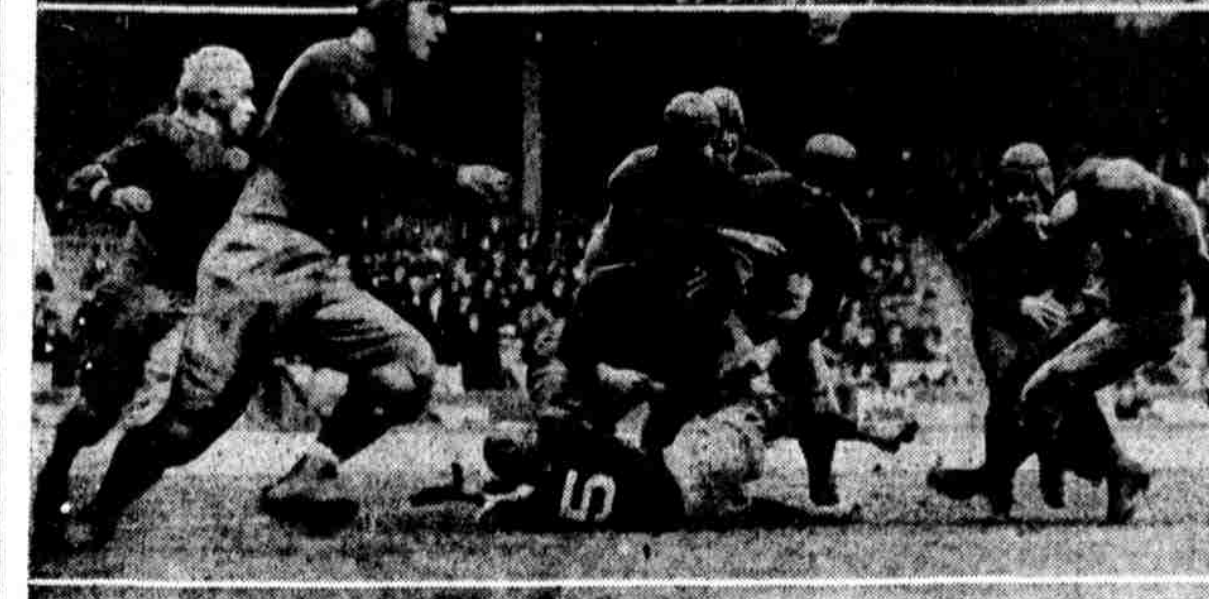

RICH PIMLICO CUP TO EXTERMINATOR

Maryland Distance Prize Won by Famous McGee Gelding Three Years in Succession

Three years ago the Pimlico Cup was instituted, being a handicap race at two and a fourth miles, with \$10,000 added by the racing association.

The race yesterday was not a gift to Exterminator by any means, as he only defeated K. M. Ross' Boniface by a head. Boniface held on gamely over the long route, but was not quite good enough to overcome the leader.

Exterminator finished a bad third, for which he received \$1000. General Armando Diaz, the Italian commander, was to have presented the cup to the victor, but was unavoidably detained and sent his regrets.

The fall racing comes to an end at Pimlico today with the running of a card in which the Thoroughbred will show something of the popularity of the meet more than 45,000 paid admissions were recorded last Friday.

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"Start Right!" Is Guilford's Advice to Rookie Golfers

Links Jammed With Men Whose Game Never Improves Because They Have Never Applied Fundamental Principles

RECENTLY I was asked by a young man about to take up golf: "Shall I go to a pro and learn the game from the start, or shall I play around a while, get the hang of the game and then take lessons?"

My answer was, "Start in right. Go to a pro, have him select a set of clubs for you, take lessons and follow his advice. Then you will not later be striving to correct your style or lack of style."

Golf courses are crowded with men whose game never improves. They seem content to play around a certain average, perhaps a few strokes better today, a few strokes worse tomorrow. Take the usual golfer of this kind, for instance. Occasionally he wakes up to the fact that he is not improving.

"What is the matter with my game?" he asks. Perhaps the next day his score will be on the sunny side of his average. "What a wonderful day!" he says. "I wish I could have it all the time!"

And then with all the conceit of the usual "never-will-improve" golfer he comes to a detail of his golfing with his friends, perhaps taking off a few strokes here and adding a birdie or two there.

The golfer who, after years of clubbing around, finally decides to take lessons, has an equally unattractive time. His stance is wrong, his grip is wrong, his swing is wrong! Even his clubs are the victims of the pro's disparagement.

It is not to be construed that professionals follow a hard-and-fast rule of teaching.

EVERY professional has his own method of instruction, but there are certain principles in golf from which no pro varies. In subsequent articles I will deal with these principles in detail.

Then again it does a student of golf no harm to change his teacher occasionally, or if not to make a complete change, to have another instructor criticize his game. It may be that he is in a rut, that some one factor in his game has been overlooked.

To the golfer who has reached a certain stage in the game where he shows no improvement, yet who is taking lessons and following absolutely the instructions of his professional, my advice is to go to another pro and have him make suggestions as to how conditions may be bettered.

To constantly improve should be the aim of every person interested in his golf. He should be able to take part in his own tournaments.
