She was holding a small French flag in each hand and as the motor passed the marshal saw her, smiled, saluted quickly, and then lifting his hat made her a special bow. As for the troopers, well, they always do look marvelous, say I. Being a Philadelphian, what else can you expect me to say? The troop is indeed busy this week. Out with Foch yesterday and tomorrow, November 17, the annual dinner at the Armory, which they always attend in full regalia.
