

SHIELDS YOUNGER BROTHER BUT LANDS IN JAIL HIMSELF

Clever Detective Work Traces Course of Stray Bullet and Boy Takes Blame for Other's Prank

Thomas Wales' attempt to shield a younger brother, who accidentally discharged a pistol last night in their home at 2813 North Taney street, resulted in Thomas being held in \$500 bail for the Grand Jury today by Magistrate Price.

The arrest of Thomas, incidentally, was the result of regular Sherlock Holmes work by District Detectives Golden and Lebrant.

Thomas Wales owned the gun, which he had just bought for \$5. His elder and younger brothers and himself were looking at it in the second story front room of their home when it was discharged. The bullet sailed out of the window.

It might have fallen harmlessly in some one's back yard and nothing would have happened. But instead it landed in the midst of Mr. and Mrs. John Dalley's family as they were at supper in their home at 2812 North Bailey street. The bullet came in with a pinc of broken glass and flattened against the wall, passing within a few inches of one of the children.

Mr. Dalley telephoned the police, and the district detectives went to investigate.

Here Detective Golden got in his fine work. With his partner he measured the angle between the broken window and the point where the bullet struck the wall. They took a "sight" along the line which they drew from window to wall, and after some figuring, concluded the bullet must have come from the Wales' house in the next street.

What they learned when they questioned the three boys led to the arrest of Thomas.

Mr. and Mrs. Dalley were at the hearing today and pleaded with the magistrate to let Thomas go, as he was working and a good boy. The magistrate was inclined to discharge him with a fine when the older brother stepped forward and declared that Thomas was not telling the truth.

"He said he fired the pistol and threw it in a lot," said the older boy. "That's not the truth. I have the gun—I took it away from him. And he didn't fire it, Your Honor. It was our

little brother fired it, and Tom wanted to shield him."

"Too many lies have been told in this case," said the magistrate. "I'm going to hold Thomas for the Grand Jury."

2 BANDITS EACH GET 10 YRS.
Got Only \$6.10 in Fifteenth and Sansom Fruit Stand Hold-up

Two Negroes who held up and robbed Isaac Berman of \$6.10 November 6 at his fruit stand, Fifteenth street near Sansom, were sentenced to ten years each in the County Prison today by Judge Quigley in Quarter Sessions Court.

They are Charles Perry, twenty, 1024 Wood street, and William Williams, nineteen, 309 North Ninth street.

The sentences, which are the maximum, were pronounced by Judge Quigley after Assistant District Attorney Charles F. Kelley had made a plea for a sentence that would "result in stopping this type of crime in Philadelphia."

LONG TERM FOR ROBBER
Frank Barnes Is Sentenced to From Five to Seven Years

Frank Barnes, who was found guilty last Wednesday of attacking and robbing Thomas Gillen, a restaurant keeper, of 231 North Eighteenth street, today was sentenced to from five to seven years in the Eastern Penitentiary.

When taken to court he told Judge Quigley that the police of the Twelfth and Pine streets station took \$1200 from him when he was arrested and had refused to give him a receipt. His story was investigated and found to be false.

JAM AT ELEVATORS IN HALL

Police Try to Get Public to Use Western Shafts

Two traffic patrolmen and Lieutenant Caleb Brinton, of the Traffic Squad, were stationed at the elevators in the southeast corner of City Hall this morning to handle the elevator crowds.

This is the first time in the history of City Hall that it has been necessary for police to be called to aid the regular City Hall guards and the elevator starter.

The congestion was due to the fact that the new electric elevators are being installed in the northeast corner and the traffic naturally gravitates toward the south instead of toward the two western elevators. The crowd at the southeast corner became so large around court time this morning that the line extended into the rotunda, while the elevators at the northwest and south-

west corners virtually were unpatrolled.
