WINS A DIVORCE



BROWN JAMMED LID ON COURT PROBE TO PROTECT PAYROLLS

Research Bureau Disclosed
Waste in First Bureau Visited
and Inquiry Was Squelched

ROPER EXPOSES REASON “KING” OF “PALACE” ACTED

Councilman Devlin revealed today that President Judge Brown did not halt the Municipal Court investigation by the Bureau of Municipal Research until the experts of the bureau had discovered that the first department impeded into was “heavily overmanned.”

Mr. Devlin is convinced that had Judge Brown allowed the investigation to continue, every department in the court would have been found heavily overmanned.

In his latest broadside against the Municipal Court the Councilman told of the waste and extravagance discovered by the bureau in the brief time it was permitted to search into the secrets of the “Palace of Justice.”

Coupled in interest with this disclosure was the announcement today by Richard Weglein, president of Council, that he has forwarded to Judge Brown the searching questionnaire into the court’s personnel and activities prepared by Councilman Roper. This act lured the questions with all the authority of council.

The statement by Councilman Devlin is based on information supplied by the Bureau of Municipal Research. Independent Councilmen believe that the bureau’s investigation was prevented at the outset overloading of the payroll was found.

Probe Halted Quickly
