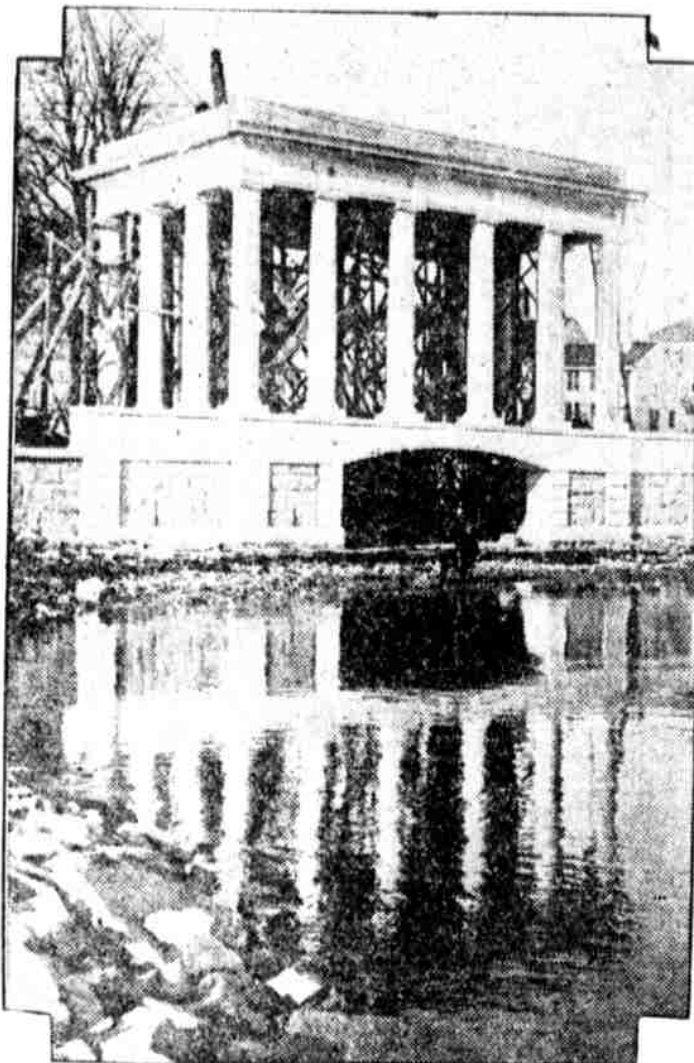




**SHE'S GOT A CUSTOMER.** Chief Justice Taft a willing buyer of Christmas stamps after he heard little girl's story.

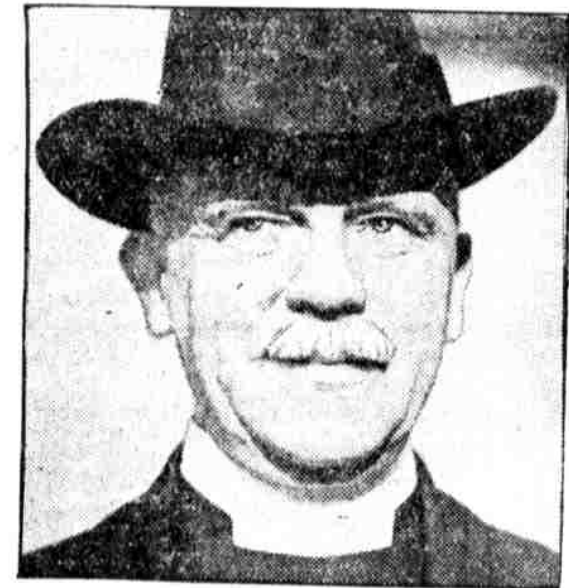

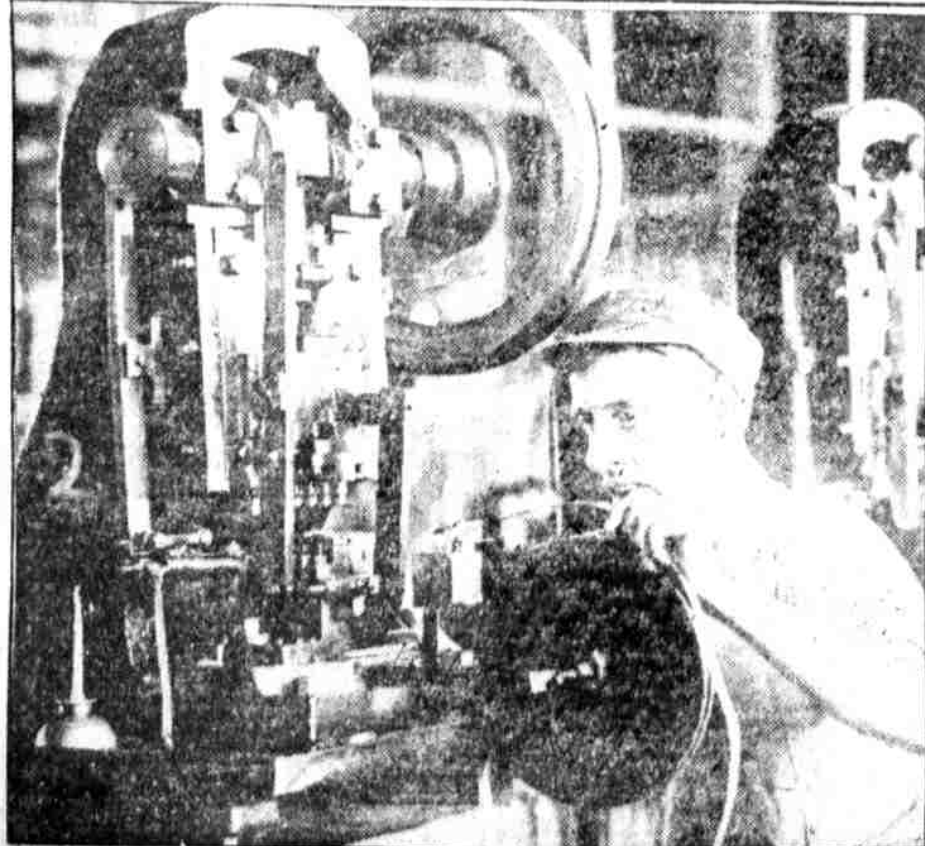


**BISHOP WILLIAM L. GRAVALL,** of West Virginia, attending the sessions of the synod at Wilmington.

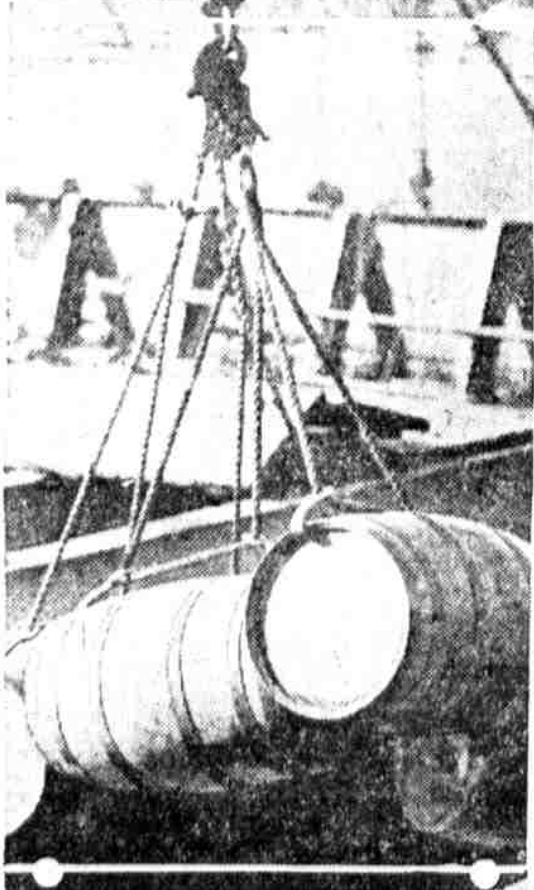


**AT GIBRALTAR.** The Prince of Wales chats with the Moorish Consul during a garden party as the first stop is made on the Prince's trip to India.

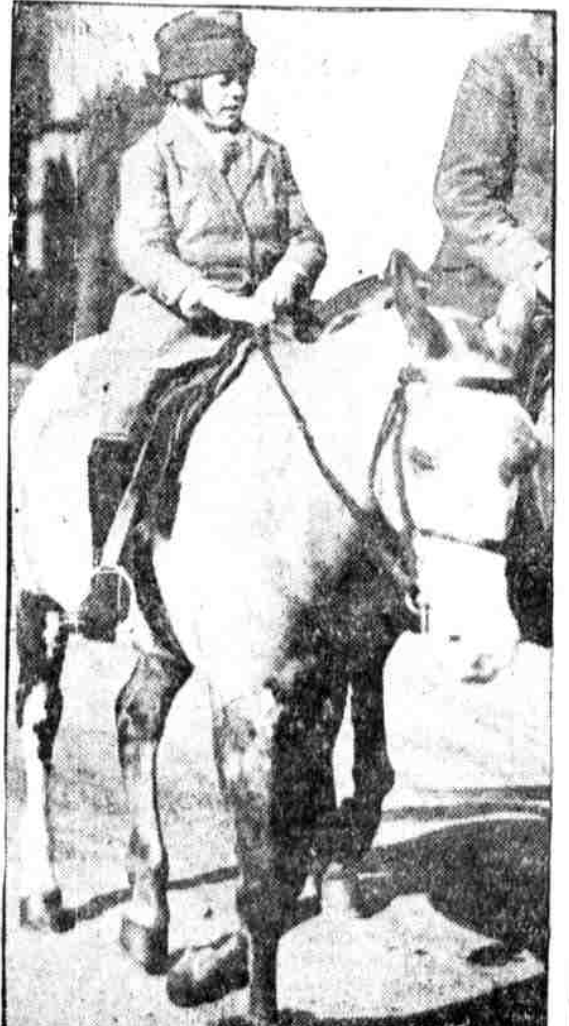
