JUST MARIONETTES

And they know also that the experts are estimating that the city will save nearly \$1,000,000 next year by doing the work itself in all the districts.

They have to defend the contract system. That is part of their job. It is the same old story of being permitted to appear on the political stage. When the strings are pulled they have to get up and pretend that they are saying things of their own volition, when in reality the words are the words of the men who expect to reap the contract profits when and if the present plans to get hold of the executive department of the City Government carry.

The contractors will have to wait until a new Mayor is elected, as the consent of the Mayor is required to divert to the pockets of the political contractors the enormous profits that are now being saved to the city.

WHO OWNS THE CITY?

IT WOULD be interesting to know whether the Frankford Board of Trade expects anything to come of its recommendation to Mayor Moore that the Frankford elevated railroad line be extended by a subway to Chestnut street near Second and Thence to Chestnut and Chestnut streets.

IT NEVER fully realized before last Thursday night how much the element of personality counts in individual success.
