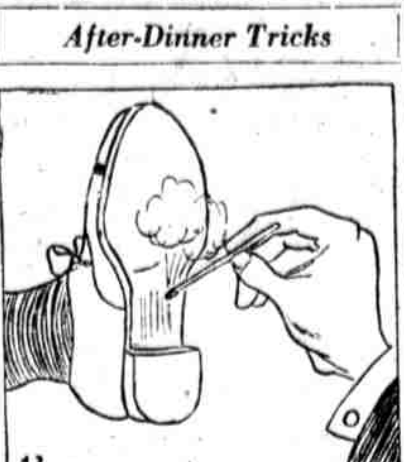
Von Scheer Says Naval Ratio
Would Tend to End Chance
of War

"MAIN FACTOR" LEFT OUT

Volmar, Nov. 21.—According to the
Hughes formula, the Anglo-Saxon
Fleet will tend to become equal while
the Japanese Fleet will be about half
as strong.
The main question is whether there
is a healthy idea behind this plan. If
the proposed plan, or something similar,
is accepted, then England's
naval supremacy, always admitted
hitherto, ceases to exist. It is re-
placed by a balance of power, which
makes it extremely dangerous for
the third, thus forcing the third to
yield. This represents a guarantee that
one of the Powers would infringe on
the rights specified in the general
agreement.
There is no chance for a single na-
tion to become dangerous to another by
attacking it: the attacked is always in
the more favorable position. For in-
stance, should England's fleet want to
attack America, it must cross the
distance six times greater than the dis-
tance separating England from Ger-
many in the World War only to find a
fleet as strong as itself, with all the
help which the resources in its back-
ground can yield. The fleet which the
British Fleet would find would not need
to worry about fuel and it could use
all the guerrilla warfare tactics in its
arsenal.
Moreover, according to the Hughes'
plan, the British Fleet would arrive at
the American coast in a proportion
of strength of eleven to nine, whereas,
at the battle of Skagerrack the British
had a superiority of fifteen to nine, and
at the battle, only 200 miles from the
British base, ended in a failure. In
the Pacific, Japan has no chance
against the west coast of America since
her strength is five to nine, but Japan
has a great chance for attacking the
American vanguards—the Philippines.
The loss of the Philippines would be
more of a loss of prestige for
America than damage which might de-
cide a war. To develop the Philippines
into a very strongly fortified group
would represent a great threat against
Japan on account of the proximity to

Nippon. Since America must protect
a group of islands 7000 miles from San
Francisco the strength would be right
if formed according to the principle
that the attacking party is to have the
better chances, so that an outbreak of
war can be prevented. The main con-
dition is that there be no secret al-
liances between any two of these Powers.
Thanks to the Hughes ratio making
an easy victory for a combination of
two of the Powers, the probability of
war is lessened as far as the naval line
is concerned.
The main factor has not been con-
sidered with sufficient clearness.

MELLON AIDS UNIVERSITY
Secretary and His Brother Give
Land Costing \$1,500,000
Pittsburgh, Nov. 21.—A. W. Mellon,
Secretary of the Treasury, and his
brother, R. B. Mellon, have given to
the University of Pittsburgh a plot of
land acquired at a cost of \$1,500,000.
It was announced by John C. Bowman,
chancellor, last night. The property, of
fourteen acres, lies between the univer-
sity and Carnegie Institute, in the edu-
cational center of the city, and on it
will be erected laboratories dedicated to
chemistry, physics, mathematics and bi-
ology.
The gift supplements a former gift of
the Mellons which several years ago re-
sulted in the opening of the Mellon
Institute of Research as a part of the
university.
It is the intention of the university,
Dr. Bowman said, to make the insti-
tute the "world center in scientific
teaching and research."
