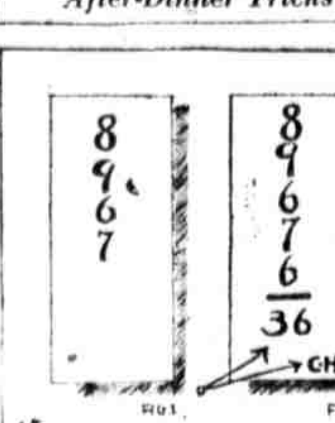
TURKEY SUPPLY PLENTIFUL

No. 15—To Find a Total of Secret Figures

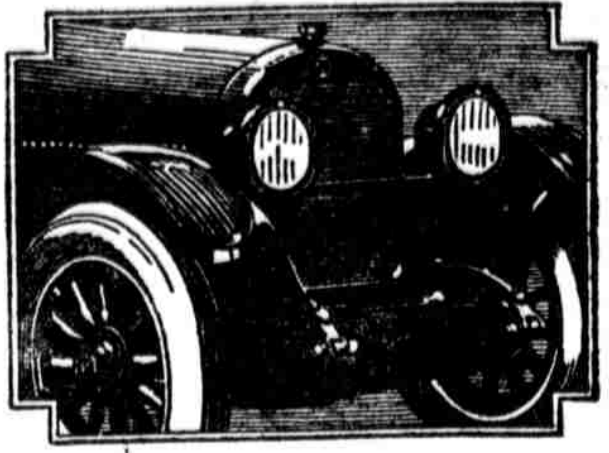
Suppose the number the performer wrote on the slip was 36. He watches the figures that the spectators are writing and when their total reaches 27 or more (which is within 9 of 36), he
