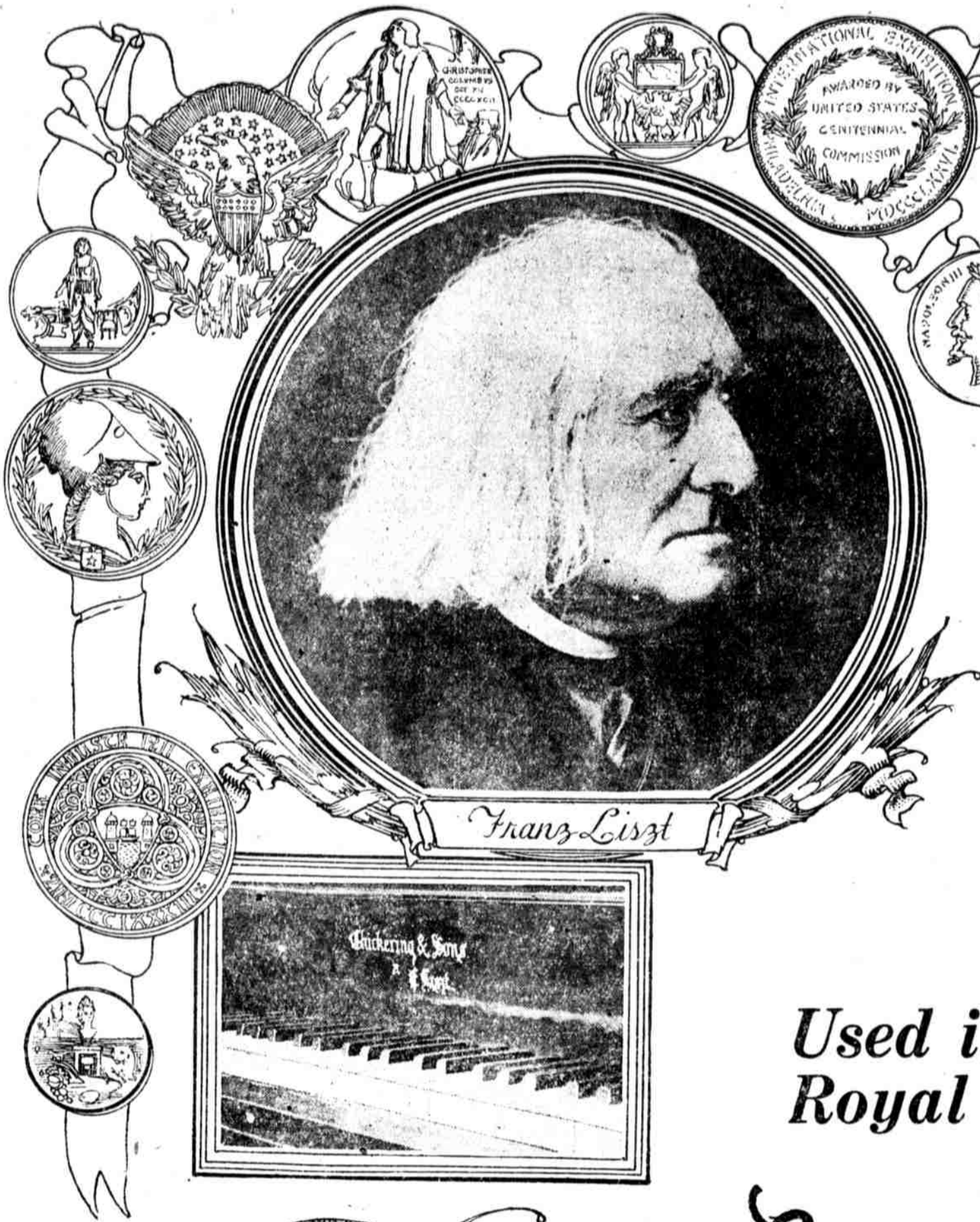

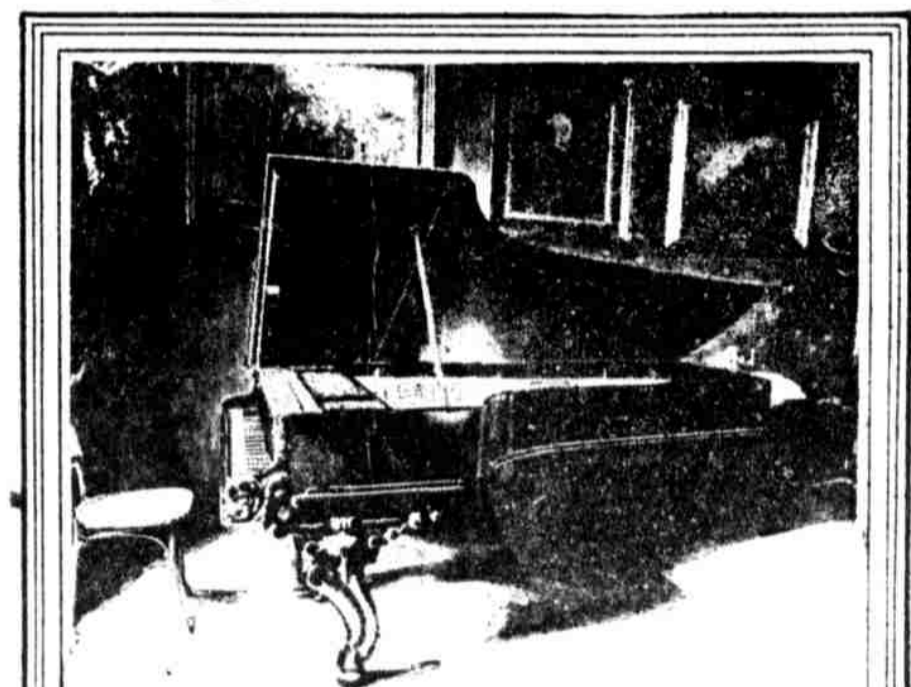

"It Is Imperial"

"Yesterday, immediately after mailing my letter to you, I went to the custom house, whence I took the piano and caused it to be transported without delay to Liszt's residence. Then I unpacked and installed it in the parlor of the maestro. Mr. Chickering was with me. As soon as the piano was on its legs the celebrated pianist seated himself before it, and the harp-like arpeggios, the bird-like trills, the thundering octave passages, which rolled from the noble instrument were most marvelous. About half-way in this tremendous test the maestro ceased playing and spoke thus (I give you his words verbatim): 'C'est imperial! Je n'ai jamais eu qu'un piano pouvait posséder de telles qualités.' (It is imperial!) I never thought that a piano could possess such qualities.' Then, taking Chickering by both hands, with most hearty hand shakes, he said to him: 'Cela vous fait honneur, monsieur! Ce piano me donne envie de toucher du piano. Je vous en remercie, et j'en aurai un soin jaloux.' (This instrument does you honor, sir! This piano makes me feel like playing the piano. I thank you for it, and will take most jealous care of it.)"
