

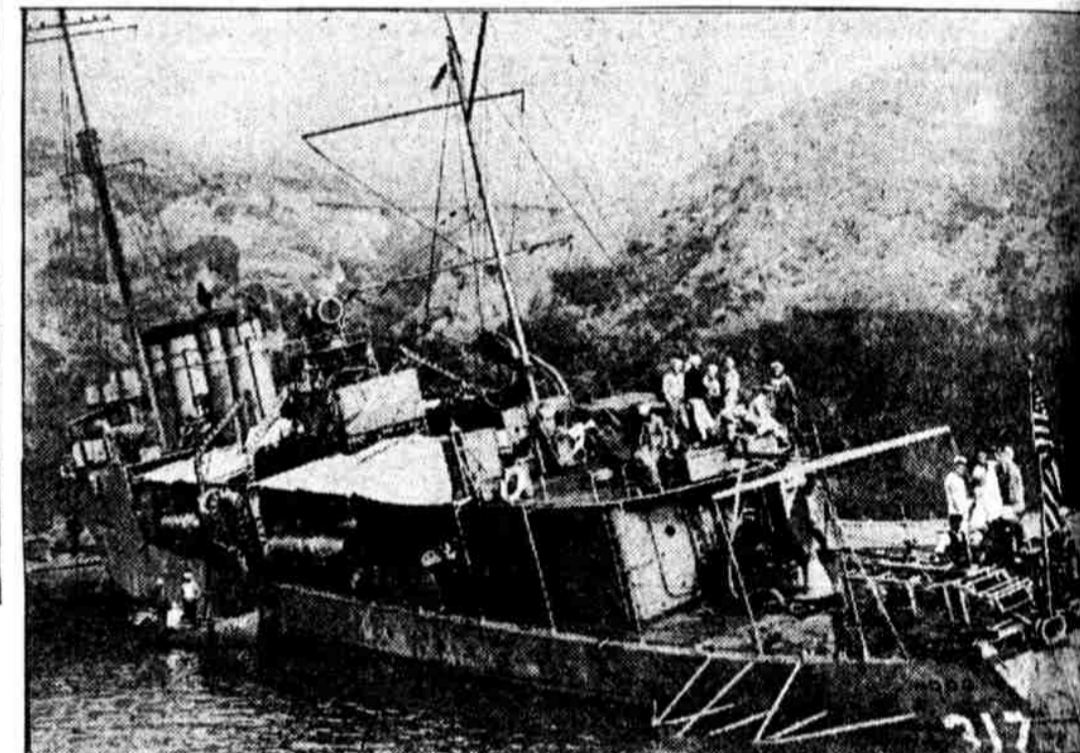
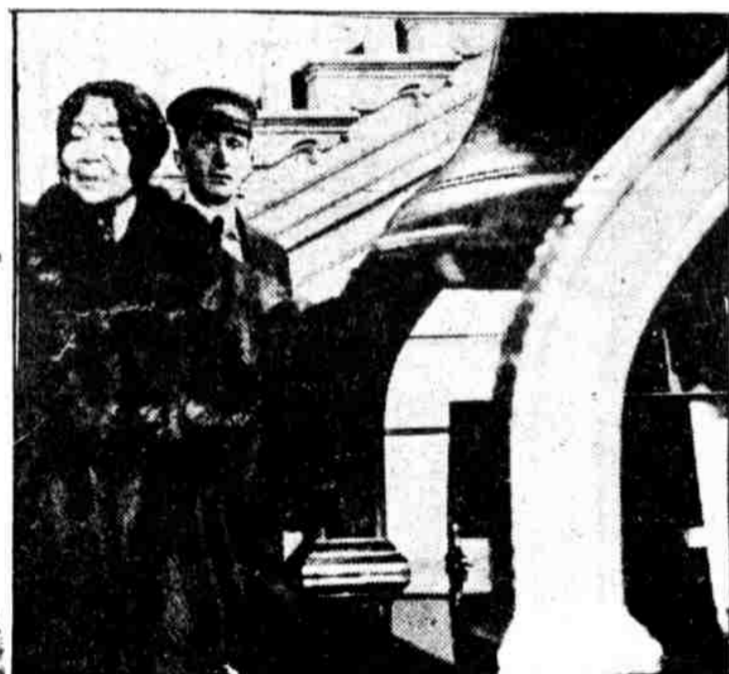

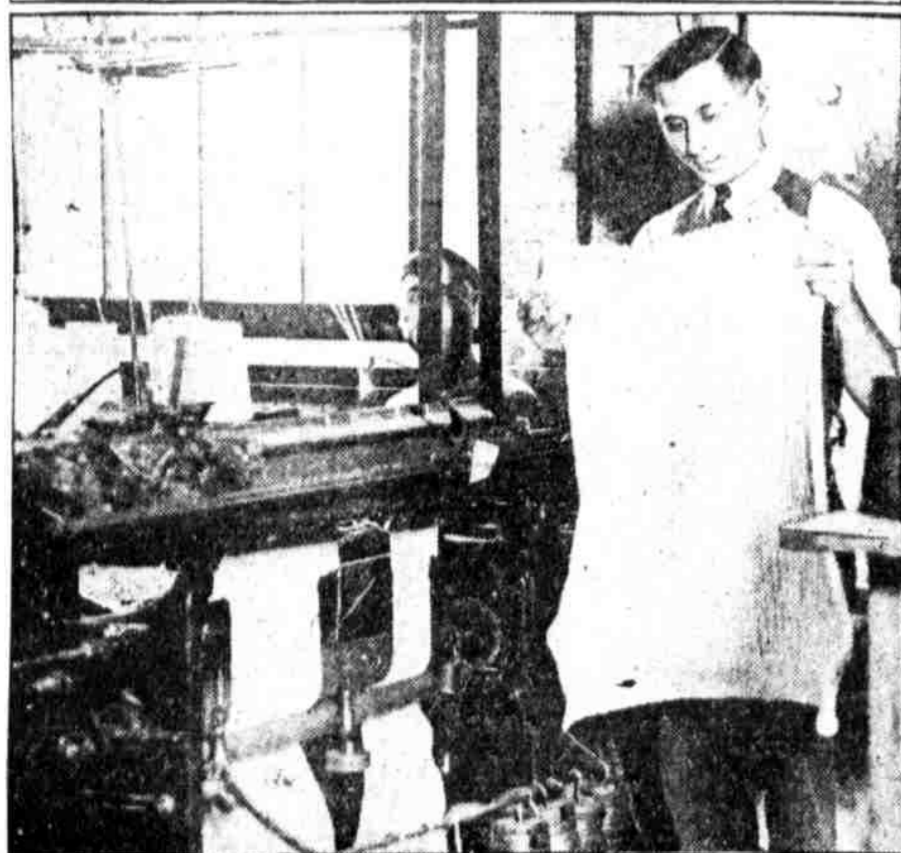
DOING A CLASSIC DANCE. Madame Anna Pavlova, the Russian dancer, who is now making a tour of the United States. She was in Philadelphia recently.
