

SLAYER OF GUARD NAMED AS BANDIT

Hastings Identified as Man Who Held Up Auto Service Worker Day Before Murder

VICTIM IS BURIED

James Hastings, confessed slayer of Park Guard Hanley, was identified in Central Station today as the man who held up George Whelan at Holmes street and the Bowery house late Friday, the day before Hanley was shot.

The guard was mortally wounded at Sixteenth street and the Parkway as he was questioning Hastings, who was in a motorcar that had been stolen a few minutes before.

Widener today testified he was at work in a gas station on the Bowery when he heard three men come in. He identified Hastings as the man who showed a revolver against his breast while the others rifled the cash register.

Magistrate Carson asked Hastings if he wanted to question Widener.

"No," he snapped. "I wasn't out of the house that night. He was held without bail on a charge of highway robbery."

The funeral of Hanley took place this morning in the Church of St. Francis Xavier, Tenth, Fourth and Green streets, where solemn requiem mass was said.

Thirty-five Park Guards, under Captain Dunne, acted as the escort in the funeral procession to the cemetery.

Several thousand persons looked out the face of the guard last night at the home of John McLaughlin, with whom Hanley boarded, at 827 Windsor place. There were floral offerings from the Quaker City taxi drivers, the Yellow Cab taxi drivers, the Fairmount Park guards, the Magistrates, and Constables Association, Moose Lodge and the Spanish-American War Veterans Association.

These organizations were represented also at the funeral today.

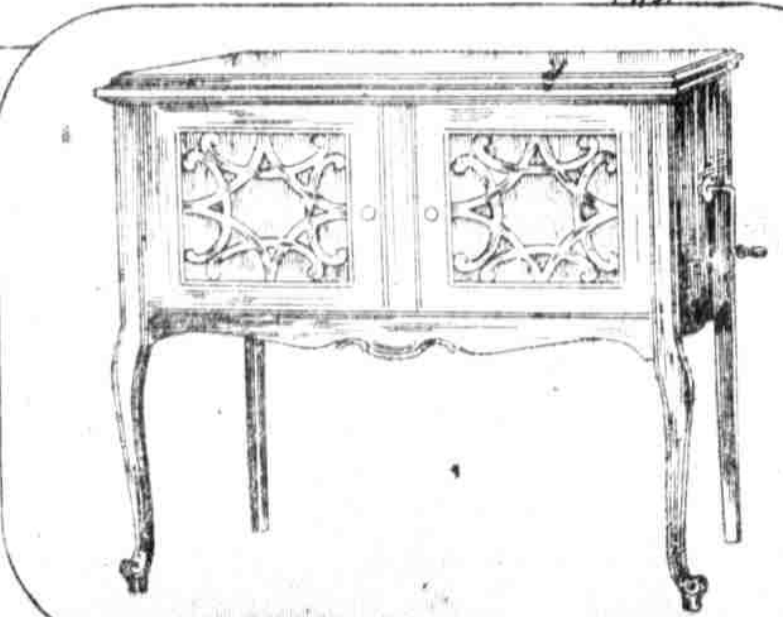

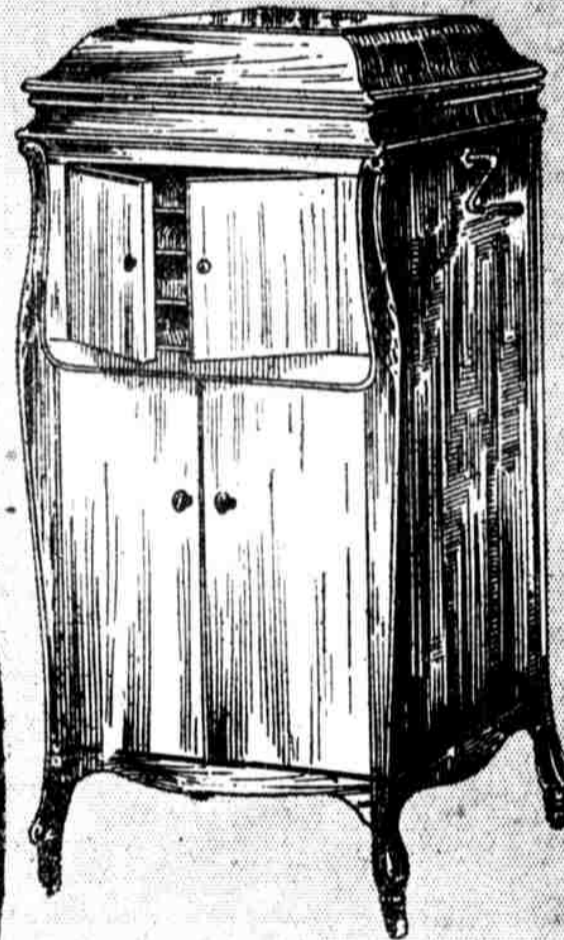

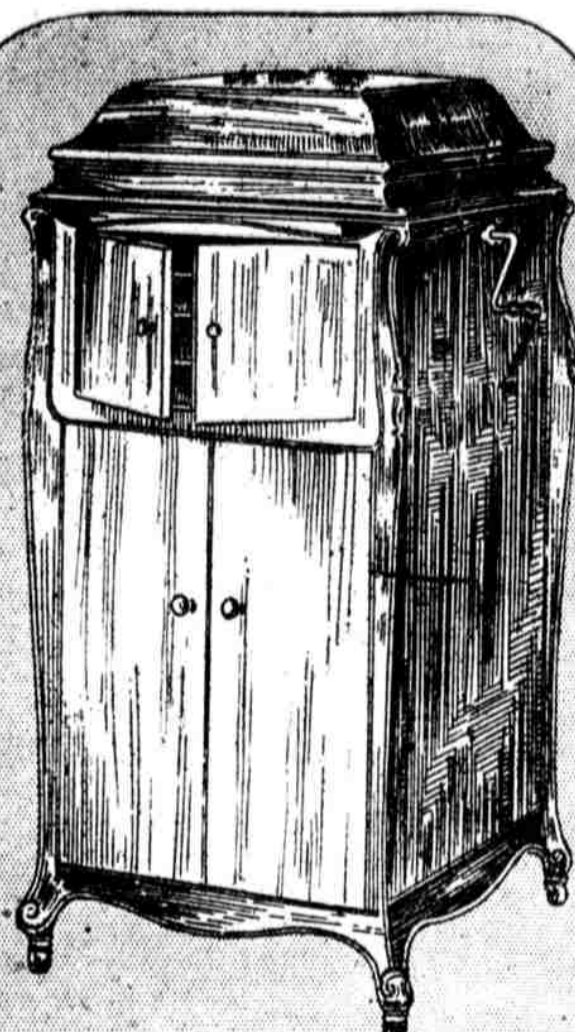
