THE following interesting facts concerning the origin of the mantle and the use of these remarkable royal mantles years ago.

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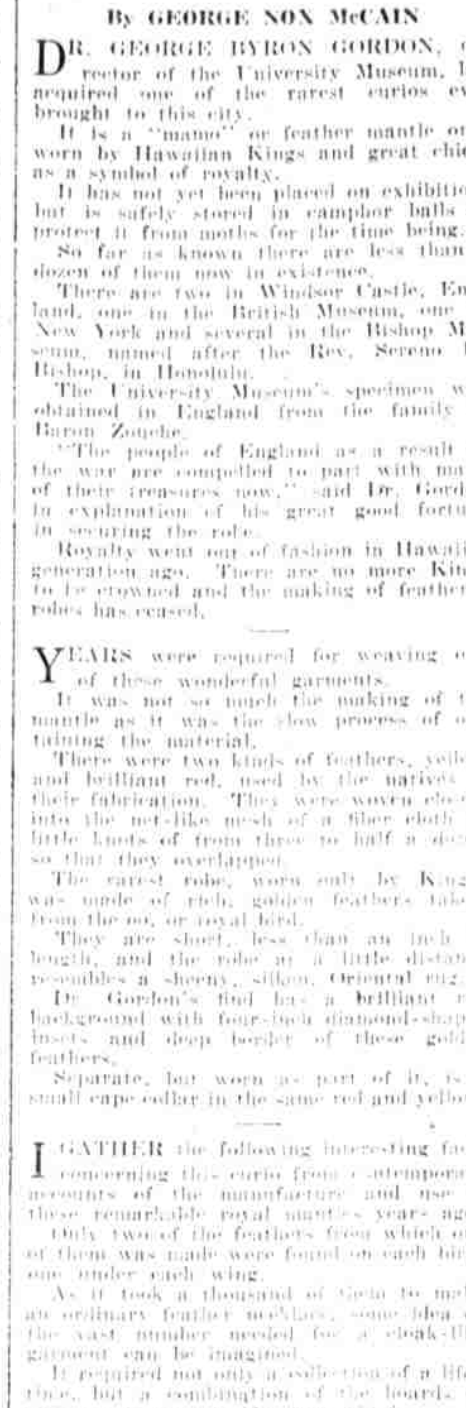
