Probers Five Hours on Scene

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SUBMARINE CAUGHT IN MUD; ESCAPE BY TORPEDO TUBES

Crew Clings to Pinnacle Ten Hours Until Rescued—Burn Mattresses for Flare

THREE SUFFER FROM GAS: IN BROOKLYN HOSPITAL

New York, Dec. 8.—The Lake submarine S-48, with a crew of fifty-one men aboard, made a nose dive off Bridgeport, Conn., harbor during a test yesterday and stuck to the bottom.

Use Matches for Flare

When night came on some of the fifty-one officers, sailors and mechanics went down into the sunken craft and hauled out mattresses to burn in order to get a brighter signaling flare than dry matches could give.

Three Suffer From Gas

These three men held for observation and treatment for acute gas poisoning after the submarine S-48 was raised from the mud. They were taken to the Brooklyn Hospital.

Due to Open Hatch

An official explanation of why the submarine suddenly slid down by the stern to the bottom of the sound mud came from officials of the construction company which built her, naval officers said.

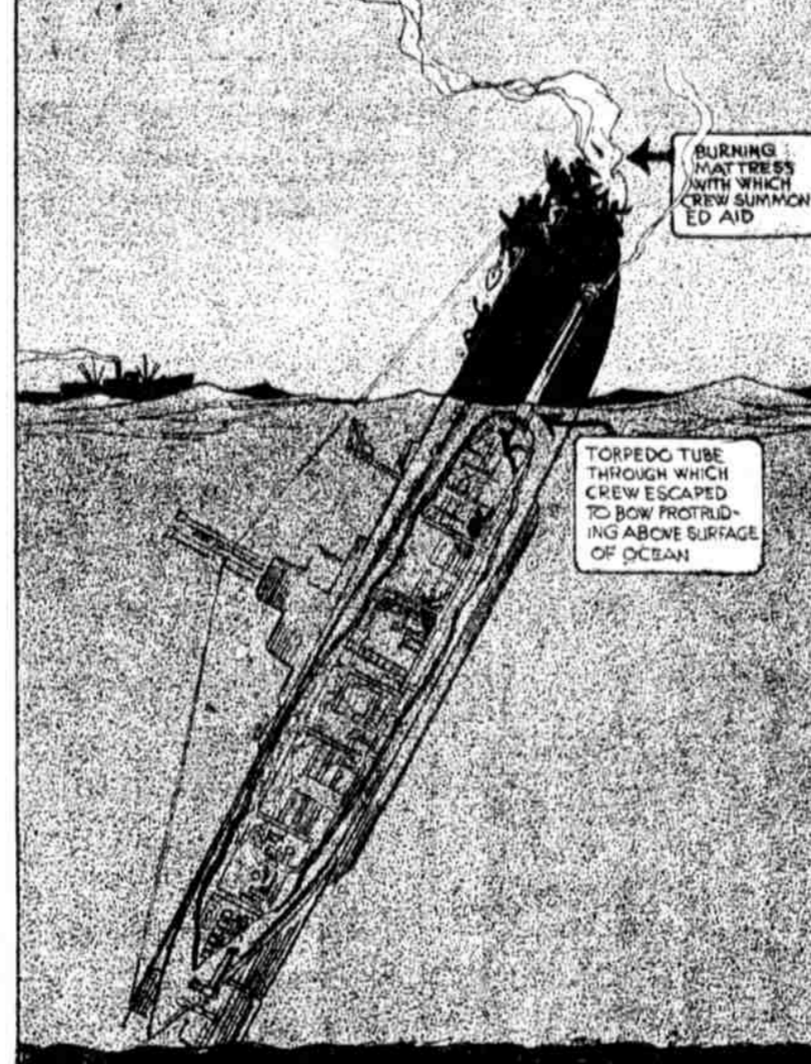
Salvaging Operations Begun

American Publicity Vague

News here is vague and American publicity is unsatisfactory. One source of information speaks of Japan's acceptance of the arbitration and cooling-off agreement as the definite result thus far, but this is incorrect.

Details Not Worked Out

The acceptance of the other proposals from Tokio is tentative in the sense that details have not been worked out or agreed to. It is not clear that the 5-5-3 ratio is not itself one of the details in other words, that Japan has done no more than agree to naval reduction as a part of a scheme which includes non-fortification by America of Guam and other islands.

China Problems Remain

These proposals tentatively agreed to by Tokio cover the Pacific and naval disarmament, but they do not cover the mainland of Asia, which remains to be worked out in the negotiations now proceeding slowly in committee meetings between China and Japan with respect to Shantung.
