MAJOR LEAGUE OWNERS DUNDEE IN FIELD ALL PRIMED TO FIGHT FOR RETURN OF DRAFT

Exorbitant Prices Asked for Minor League Stars Cause Moguls to Take Action in Meetings in New York This Week

THE 1922 baseball season is well under way, running smoothly and has grabbed the entire sport stage. The grand old national pastime usually horns in about this time of the year, and when it does everything else is forotten. The football season still is lukewarm, but that makes no difference. No sooner was the Army and Navy game over than the owners and managers of big league ball clubs stepped into the open, and are there to remain until

Pootball took the count when Judge Landis handed down his decision which flattened the bankrolls of Bob Meusel and Bill Piercey and slightly annoyed Babe Ruth financially. Before the fans ceased talking about this, Jawn McGraw up and buys Heinie Groh for the Giants and scored a complete knockout when he handed out \$75,000 for First Baseman O'Connell, who will be delivered at the end of the 1922 season. Frank Navin, of Detroit, and Garry Herrmann also kicked in with a couple of heavy financial deals, and this also made interesting reading.

Now we have the annual league meetings in New York this week. Tomorrow the National League will meet behind barred doors at the Waldorf, and on Wednesday the American will be in action in the Commodore. A joint meeting is scheduled for Thursday, and by that time everybody will know all about the prospects of the clubs for the coming campaign. When it comes time to cop the spotlight, baseball lets go with both barrels.

The usual business will be transacted at the gatherings, which means the ners will get together, try to arrange a few trades and discuss the high cost of playing. There also will be an attempt to shorten the World Series to seven games, which should be perfectly satisfactory to both of our Philadelphia clubs, because it's just the same to them. They don't have to work after the

Another important subject to be discussed is the draft. Since the minors decided to go it alone they have made more money than ever before in selling layers and will attempt to keep conditions as they are. The recent transactions virtually have killed all chances for the return of the draft, for when an owner can draw \$75.000 for a player like O'Connell and retain his services for one year, and a club can get \$40.000 and some players for a pair of pitchers neh as were sold to Detroit there's no reason-from the viewpoint of the alnor leaguers-to return to the old system, where the draft price was

Trouble Ahead for Club Owners

TT WILL not be easy sailing for the major league club owners this coming season. Disgruntled stars will become more disgruntled, holdouts will be numerous and during the winter months we will read about the voluntary retirement of many famous players.

The first will be Eddie Roush, of the Reds. Eddie wants to leave that lear Cincinnati and hook on with another club, meaning the Giants. He has demanded a salary which would make President Harding jealous, and says there will be nothing doing unless the Reds come through. He is kicking in with the same stuff that Heinie Groh pulled. Heinie modestly demanded \$24,000 for next year and was punished by being sent to New York. Roush rants some of the same punishment.

However, Garry Herrmann says his star outfielder will not get the money he asked for, will not be sold or traded and will not play baseball unless it is with the Cincinnati Baseball Club. In other words, he will receive the same reatment as Groh last year, when he was allowed to remain idle five weeks and draw no pay. Garry says he expects Roush to remain on his farm next simmer, for there will be no room for him on the ball club unless he signs the

papers originally offered by the management. Milton Stock is in again and Branch Rickey is anxious to get rid of him. Milton is one of the best third-sackers in the business, hits well and is a valtable man for any ball club, but his business methods have not made a hit with the owners. Every year Stock is a holdout. He demands a big increase in salary and will not make a move until he gets a new contract. This has happened year after year, and Milton has been able to dodge the unprofitable training trips down South.

He worked this stunt on the Phils until President Baker traded him to St. Louis, and then Rickey fell heir to a lot of trouble. The mere fact he wants to get rid of a high-class player is the tip-off.

There is a rumor that Pittsburgh would like to get Stock. Perhaps Barney Dreyfuss wants to try his hand at taming the third baseman, as he is a past master in that line of work. It is said that a deal is pending whereby Whitted, Tierney and Barnhart will be traded, and while it seems to be a whole lot for one man, the trade might go through,

According to gossip, there were two factions on the Pirate club last fall then the team cracked, folded up and lost the pennant, and it is up to Dreyfuss either to dispose of Manager Gibson or the malcontents.
