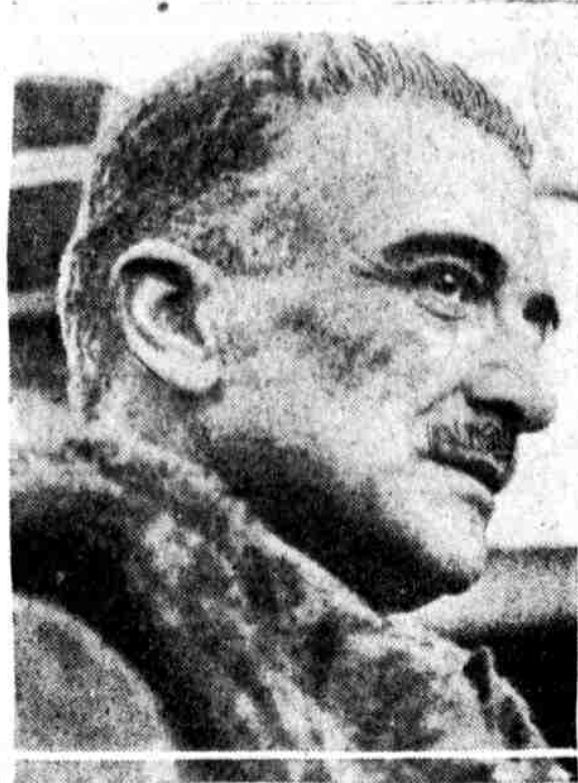

HIS FAREWELL PHOTOGRAPH. General Armando Diaz, Italy's hero, takes a parting look at New York.

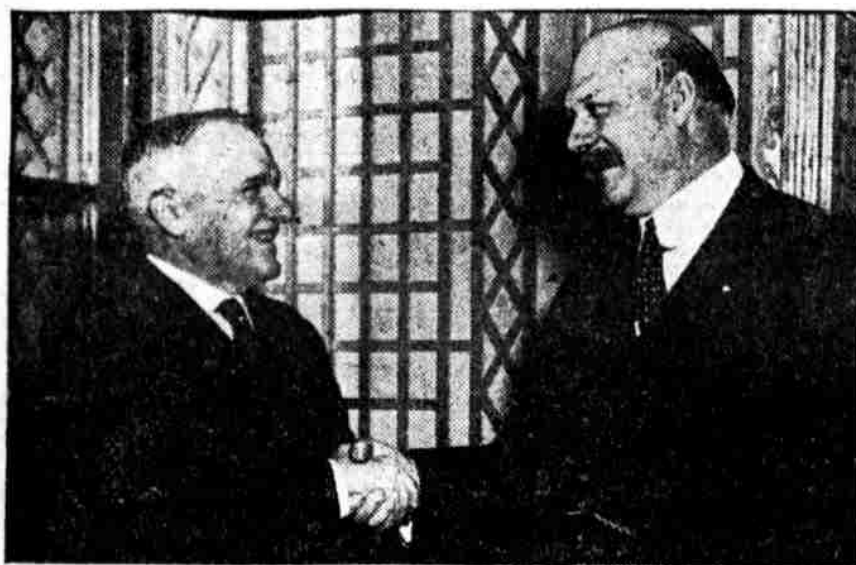


MRS. BUTTORA, who nursed King Victor Emmanuel of Italy for many months, leaves America for a home provided by him.
