INSURANCE RIGHT EXTENDED

Four Years' Time in Which Lapsed War Risks Can Be Reinstated

The time for reinstatement in the war-risk insurance has been extended four years, according to an announcement by the United States Veterans' Bureau. The time limit was formerly December 31 of this year, but it has been extended until March 4, 1925.

It has come to the attention of the bureau that a great number of men have allowed their insurance to lapse because they do not realize their rights both to reinstate and convert their insurance into a more permanent form. The requirements for reinstatement have been simplified.

FUNERAL ARRANGED FOR WRECK VICTIMS

Unidentified Dead Will Be Buried After Community Service Tomorrow

TO USE TWO CASKETS

Coroner Neville, of Montgomery County, today issued certificates of release permitting removal of the bodies of the unidentified victims of the Bryn Athya wreck to Churchville and Southampton for interment at a community funeral to be held tomorrow from the Dutch Reformed Church in Churchville. The inquest will be held at Norristown next Tuesday.

Bodies released are those of H. Voorlees Hogeland, Miss Emma Leedom, Mrs. Morris Van Hart and Mrs. William Sinkler, of Southampton, and Earl

Slak, Norman Rhodes and Miss Lena George, of Churchville. There is also an eighth body, that of Charles T. Scott, Philadelphia instructor, whose home was at Churchville but identification has been made of this body by his wife.

There are but six entire bodies, representative of the eight known dead. The funeral will be directed by Under-taker Leedom, of Southampton, and the charred bodies will be placed in two large caskets, on the lids of which will be silver name plates bearing the names of the eight residents of the two little Bucks County hamlets whose bodies were charred beyond all hope of recognition.

Business will be entirely suspended in and around Churchville and Southampton for the period of the community burial. The remains will not be exposed to view, and interment will be in a plot in the cemetery adjacent to the church.

The community funeral was arranged by a committee of citizens from Churchville and Southampton, and four ministers will assist in the service—the Rev. J. S. Roddy, of Gloucester, N. J.; the Rev. W. J. Bone, of Newtown; the Rev. Thomas McK. Polk, of Richboro, and the Rev. William H. Rowley, of Lansdale, several of the officiating clergymen being former ministers of Churchville or Southampton churches.
