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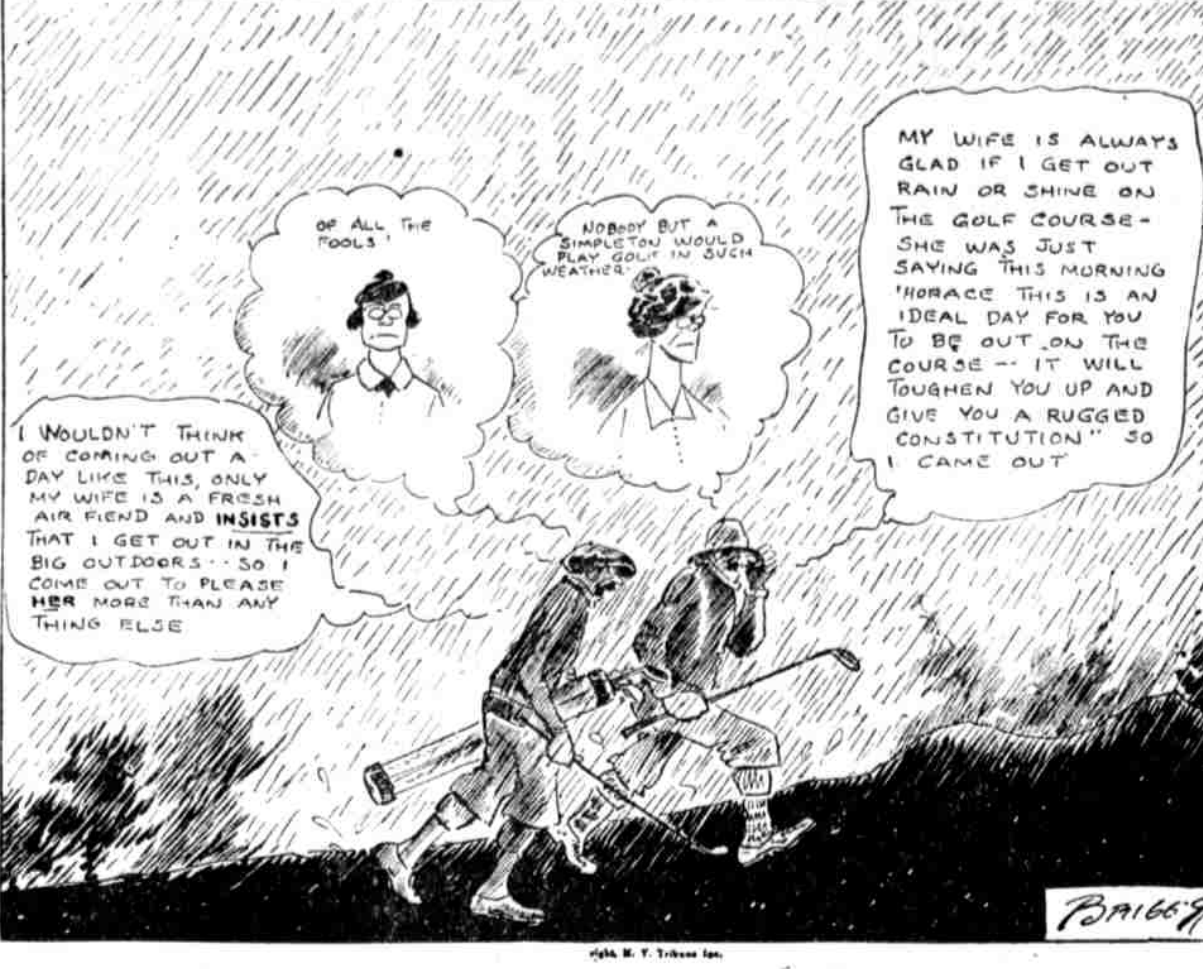

THE idea of a schoolboy golf league in this city has a direct appeal to thousands of youngsters pining to swing a club. It is illustrated by the fact that 150 candidates turned out at the first practice this week from one school alone.

West Philadelphia High School, which has more golf enthusiasts than any other school in the city, is a fact 150 students there reported for first practice.

For the ones who have never played before, another practice will be held tonight.

THE W. P. H. S. Golf Association has been formed. It is the first branch of what is the Scholastic Golf League of Philadelphia. This latter is assumed if you are interested in the enthusiastic in the various schools of the city.

As to the Speedboys, they are showing plenty. It was told the other day by Herbert Oberdorf, former scholastic New York champion, is now with us, and somewhat of a golfer here. He started in to correct the fault and has gone into it with commendable zeal.

LANSDOWNE HIGH SCHOOL has no desire to enter the proposed Delaware County Schools Athletic League. This was disclosed by Walter L. Phillips, principal of the institution, this morning.

"I do not think Lansdowne High School would care to enter an athletic league," he said. "If the school should enter an athletic association, it would mean that it would have to sever relations with some of the best schools in this vicinity."

For years we have been playing Fox Charter, Lower Merion, Radnor and Cheltenham. Should we enter this league, proposed by the Kiwanis Club, of Chester, it would mean that all of our football dates would be taken by Delaware County institutions. Therefore, the schools already named would have to be dropped from our schedules.

Students Against Move
"I do not think that the student body at Lansdowne would care to enter an athletic league," he said. "If the school should enter an athletic association, it would mean that it would have to sever relations with some of the best schools in this vicinity."

Mr. Phillips also announced that Paul Stackhouse, of the football team, has been elected to lead the eleven in 1922. He succeeds Ned Wilcox, Stackhouse will graduate from the school in 1922, while Wilcox leaves the school in 1922.

Freddie Walters, of Trenton, had previously given his consent for the playing of the contest by President Schellberg, even though the players at the game were not eligible, as they are on the suspended list, and President Schellberg was recently quoted as saying they could not return unless paying a "fine."

This is all to be adjusted at a meeting to be held tomorrow. Owner Purry is willing to give such players a "fine" and the best thing for the game would be to see that the best city that sent them to the present lineup in the circuit, meaning, of course, Philadelphia, received some consideration from the managers.

Who Can Blame Her? WE NOTE that Great Britain is already arranging for a 1922 counter charge in the hope of reuniting certain coveted sports that passed from her control.

The average Briton rarely cares to stand pat in defeat. He can stand the shock that fell upon him from our Davis Cup and polo victories. But it is something else to recall that tennis tennis crown is still being worn on this side of the water by Bill Tilden and that his main golf seer is still as far away as you know it. The straight left arm and the right elbow adjacent to the body—

With this as a foundation you should soon be well upon your way, provided you can find time to practice the proper habit begun by your instructor.

Few men can hit from a faulty balance, whether it be golf, tennis or baseball.

And the average balance in golf is about 82 per cent faulty when the top of the swing is reached.
