## 'SOX'S' SEYBOLD KILLED IN AUTO

Former Athletic Outfielder's Neck Broken When Car Goes Over Embankment

### OTHERS IN PARTY ESCAPE

Greensburg, Pa., Dec. 22.—Ralph O. ("Socks") Seybold, of Jeannette, former outfielder of the Philadelphia Athletics, was instantly killed yesterday when an automobile in which he and five other Jeannette men were riding went over an embankment at Crisinger's Curve on the Lincoln Highway east of here and overturned. Seybold's neck was broken. The other members of the party were not injured beyond slight bruises. Seybold and his companions left Jeannette about 11:30 o'clock Tuesday evening and early yesterday morning were near Loganton in the mountains when the accident occurred. The car was severely damaged during the crash and as it neared the embankment it plunged over the edge and landed on its side about fifteen feet high. The steering wheel being four times, the machine turned over and over in the crash. Seybold recently had been employed as steward of a club at Jeannette.

"Socks" Seybold will be recalled by local fans as one of the original Athletics who started the American League in this city in 1901. He played right field on the team and was noted as a heavy hitter. He continued with the club until 1908 when he was severely injured during spring training practice in New Orleans and he played very few games after that.

In 1910 he was manager of the Toledo club, but for the last ten years or so has been out of baseball. He was in the mining and lumber business, his relatives being actively engaged in these enterprises in West Virginia. His home was in Jeannette, Pa.

Seybold was one of the heaviest hitters on the old Athletic Club and gained considerable fame as a slugger. In one game at the old park at Twenty-ninth and Columbia avenue "Socks" hit a homer over Twenty-ninth street and way up one of the main streets. This feat was one of the greatest that he performed while a member of the team. Seybold was in the neighborhood of forty-five years of age. His weight and eyes were two subjects on which he was very sensitive. Even Connie Mack was never able to learn the correct figures.

On one occasion "Socks" father paid a visit to this city and Mack and the other players centered at an opportunity to accomplish their desired ends by interviewing dad, but "Socks" had evidently put him wise and their efforts were futile. Seybold was one of the most popular players on the team and Mack expressed deep regret when told the sad news this morning.

## HARVARD-GREEN FIRST MET IN 1884

Renewal of Gridiron Relations Brings to Light Interesting Games of Past

### CONTRACT FOR ONE YEAR

Harvard and Dartmouth will mingle again next October 28, when the Crimson and Big Green elevens will play football on Soldiers Field. October 28 was first given by Harvard as a date to the Penn State team, which later asked to be relieved from the engagement. Then Harvard invited the University of California to play at Cambridge on that afternoon, but yesterday the Californians wired their regrets, and the date became open again.

Head Coach Fisher for a long time has hoped to be able to arrange a game for his Harvard team with Dartmouth. The teams used to play when Fisher was in college, but the last game was that of 1913, when Harvard won by a field goal. For many years Harvard and Dartmouth played almost annually and it was the Hanover eleven that helped dedicate the Soldiers' Field stadium in the fall of 1903, by beating Carl Marshall's Harvard team.
